

Queen Square Win City Interscholastic Title; Take Round From Prince St. 8-5

Queen Square became the City interscholastic champions for 1954 when they defeated Prince Street School in the second game of a two game total goal series at the Forum last night by a score of 8-5. The first game played on Tuesday night ended in a four all draw. Queen Square therefore took the round by an eight-five decision.

The game brought forth some very nice hockey which at times had a tendency to become rough. The Q. S. S. boys took a 1-0 lead in the first period, added two more in the second and split a pair with their opponents in the third.

The winners displayed better combination and had it not been for erratic shooting on their part, the score might have been even more one-sided. Individual efforts marked Prince Street's playing and the major portion of the play was carried by three or four team members.

Dillon opened the scoring when he combined with Griffin to let go a 45 foot drive on which Acorn had no chance. Dillon early in the second period snared a loose puck just outside the P. S. S. blue line to drive a twenty footer into the left hand upper corner of the net. Shortly before the bell rang to end the second period, Kane from a scramble, slid a slow one along the ice, which Acorn misjudged and allowed to trickle into the net. A roughing spree developed at the end of the period when Griffin put Ward over the boards. For this the former was given a five

minute stretch for fighting while the P. S. S. player was tagged with a 2 minute penalty for roughing. However when Ward argued too strenuously his sentence was extended to a 10 minute misconduct. This meant that the Garnet and Gold boys played without the services of their star forward for almost the remainder of the game.

Rollie Lee who played an outstanding game for the losers kept his team from a shutout when he scored midway in the final frame, but any hopes the P. S. S. team had of evening the score were eliminated when Dowling, on a partial break away, sewed it up for his team to end the scoring 4-1.

Leafs Whip Red Wings 3-1 To Square Semi-Finals

DETROIT, (CP)—Gordie Hanigan, 160-pound Toronto Maple Leaf left-winger, scored two goals Thursday night as the Leafs whipped Detroit Red Wings 3-1 to square their Stanley Cup semi-final series at one game each. It was Toronto's first play-off victory on Detroit ice since April 6, 1950.

The Leafs, who were inept in dropping the opener 5-0, outplayed the Wings for practically the 60 minutes and now rate as an even choice as the best-of-seven series shifts to Toronto for the next two games.

Hanigan, a fleet five-foot-seven sophomore seeing play-off action for the first time, scored at 17:41 of the second period and again at 2:16 of the third, boosting the Leafs into a 3-0 lead. Sid Smith scored for Toronto at 9:16 of the opening stanza.

The Red Wings rallied briefly with defenceman Marcel Pronovost clicking at 4:52 of the third period, but they never came close after that.

Wing defenders, fed the puck to Hanigan, who feinted Sawchuk out of position and backhanded a 10-footer in a wide-open net.

The 25-year-old winger, who tallied only four times in 34 regular season games, clicked in the third period on another 10-foot backhander, after picking up a loose puck off the boards.

Although he failed to figure in the scoring, Leaf captain Ted Kennedy was a leader for the second straight game. He led several brilliant rushes only to miss when the puck either flew wide or Sawchuk came up with a timely stop.

Moore Sets Scoring Mark As Canadiens Win 8-1

MONTREAL, (CP)—Dickie Moore, 23-year-old Montreal boy, set two Stanley Cup scoring records Thursday night in leading Montreal Canadiens to an 8-1 rout of Boston Bruins in the second game of their semi-final playoff series.

A third record went by the boards when 23 penalties, including eight majors and two misconducts, were called in gory outbursts of fighting.

Moore's records were: The fastest goal scored in Stanley Cup play, the greatest number of scoring points in one game.

He started the five-goal first-period spurge after only 10 seconds of play and before the one-sided affair ended had counted another and picked up four assists for a total of six points.

The 10-second goal beat the old mark of 15 seconds set by Sid Smith of Toronto April 11, 1951, in a game at Toronto between Canadiens and the Leafs.

The six points bettered the old record of five held jointly by four players and made at various times since 1942 by Don Metz of Toronto, Eddie Bush of Detroit, and Maurice (Rocket) Richard and Toe Blake of Montreal.

The win was Canadiens' second straight in the best-of-seven series. The teams play the next two games in Boston Sunday and Tuesday.

Boom Boom Geoffrion and Jean Beliveau—Moore's linemates—also accounted for two goals each and singles were counted by Lorne Davis and Paul Meger.

The 23 penalties were two more than the old record of 21 set March 31, 1951, between Boston and Toronto at Toronto.

A total of eight majors, three misconducts and 12 minor penalties were called. Each team had four majors. Three of the batlers in the first outburst of fighting drew majors again in the second slugfest and automatically drew misconduct penalties also.

The Bruins had two of three misconducts and Montreal one. In addition, Canadiens had seven minors and Boston five.

In the previous record-setting game of 1951 there were four majors, one misconduct and 16 minors.

Goalie Jim Henry looked weak on a couple of the five goals in the first period, but the wild run-away wasn't all his fault. The Bruin defence was woefully weak and improved little the rest of the way.

Fleming Mackell scored Boston's only goal at 17:02 of the second period.
