

Saint John Beavers Down Glace Bay 3-1

GLACE BAY, N.S., Nov. 4 — (CP) — Saint John Beavers continued their pace setting in the Maritime Major Hockey League Saturday night with a clean cut 3-1 win over Glace Bay Miners.

A total of 4,125 cash customers watched the league leaders fight their way through 60 minutes of blazing hockey featured by an epidemic of penalties in the opening period.

Johnny Ubrico, the 27-year-old centre from Sault Ste. Marie, Ont., led Beavers with a goal and two assists.

Eight players were waved to the sin bin in the opening period with John Arundel of Saint John making the trip twice.

Miners controlled play during the final frame but brilliant work by Beavers netminder Phil Hughes saved the day.

In the final minutes Miners coach Bud Fole yanked his goalie in a mass attack but the move failed to pay off.

Mild weather and the packed house kept the ice surface far from perfect. The second and third periods were played in a blanket of fog.

Beavers meet Sydney Millionaires Monday and return to Glace Bay Tuesday.

S'ide Airmen Defeat S.D.U. Rugbyists 10-8

A determined, hard-tackling performance by a band of Airforce rugbyists from the Summerside Airport turned the tables on the Saint Dunstan's University inter-mediate club at the S. D. U. ground on Saturday afternoon by a score of 10-8 in a return exhibition rugby contest.

It was the first defeat for the Saints aggregation in three starts this season, having earlier defeated the air boys 21-0 and the Prince of Wales College squad 19-0.

It was just retribution for the R.C.A.F. boys for their earlier shellacking as a small crowd of fans saw them battle Saints at every stage of the game to roll up a score of 10-2 before the end of the first half and although losing ground in the closing half, against a driving Saints club, manage to cling on to a winning advantage despite two S. D. U. tries.

Making long territorial gains with expert dribbling and backfield runs, the R.C.A.F. boys came up with two well-earned tries in the first half that were nearly converted by fullback Ian Marshall.

The Airforce boys opened the scoring at the four minute mark of the half when they broke out with a slick backfield run from their own 40 yard line with J. M. Lamont dashing the last 20 yards to plant the ball right between the uprights for an easy convert.

Driving back hard despite effective tackling on the part of the opposition, Saints came up with their only scoring of the frame at the 15 mark. Saints fullback Jack Reardon booted the ball over the bar on a place kick from 25 yards out when they were awarded a penalty kick for a rule infraction by the Airforce.

Once again the Airforce boys put on the pressure. Dribbling, kicking and running they worked the ball back into Saints zone in the latter stages of the frame where they pulled another clever scoring run from Saints 45 yard line at the 27 minute mark. It was W. Hedges who scooped in a nice pass at the end of the halfline attack to crash his way over the line with fullback Marshall once again coming through with the extra points with a neat convert.

Holding a greater margin on the play, Saints went over for two hard-earned tries in the final half against a determined Airforce defence.

Allan MacDonald crashed his way over the line at the right corner of the field on an attack with Lloyd Gaudet from a 15 yard scrum at the nine minute mark to roll the score to 10-5 after Reardon failed for the extra two points from a hard convert angle.

Battling off repeated attempts

by the Airforce for the next fifteen minutes, Saints once again took command of the play and forcing a 10 yard scrum in deep R. C. A. F. territory Lloyd Gaudet plunged over at almost the identical spot of the previous try. Once again Reardon tried the convert that would have deadlocked the score, but once again failed for the extra points on the hard-angle boot. The score came at the 28 minute mark.

Saints were pressing hard for the winning try when the game ended with the Airforce boys still holding their two point edge. A penalty kick by Reardon with one second left in the game might have turned the trick but as before he was stymied with a bad angle kick and a cross wind that foiled a game hearted attempt.

It was a heartbreaking goal by defenceman Bob Gray that robbed the Hawks and goalie Don Lockhart of a shutout win but it was the goal of the game to a delighted local crowd who jammed the Forum to capacity and nearly lifted the roof off the structure when Gray rifled Willie Marshall's pants into the mesh from thirty feet out with only 15 seconds left in the third frame. It was the glorious end to a make or break piece of strategy by Leo "The Lion" Lamoureux that his team backed him to the fullest on and made good.

Garnering a faceoff at the 18:44 mark to the right of the Moncton cage, Lamoureux yanked out goalie Hal Gordon even though his team was playing a man shy as was Moncton, that gave his team the extra forward advantage in the all out gamble. After forcing three faceoffs with an empty net behind them, Islanders rambled all the way on the play that saw it nearly backfire before they finally turned the trick. Duff, a mad scramble for possession of the puck, Moncton shot it out over the blueline, and except for a wild dash by Willie Marshall, who outskated an opposing forward back for it, the final story might have been different. Averaging a possible breakaway by Hawks on the play, Marshall grabbed off the puck, stick-handled his way back in over the blueline to slip the pay off pass to a waiting Bob Gray. That was it.

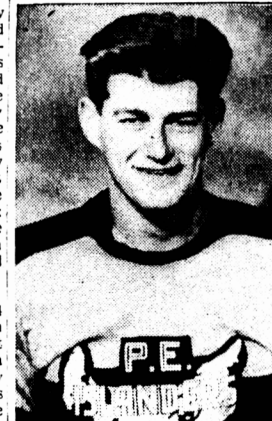

Islanders Came From Behind For 1-All Tie With Moncton Hawks

A blasting 70-foot slapshot by defenceman Bob Gray with only fifteen seconds to go in the third period was the climax feature that gave Charlottetown Islanders a 1-1 draw decision with Johnny Horek's Moncton Hawks here on Saturday night in a Maritime Hockey League "Big Six" feature, a game that continued deadlocked after 10 minutes of overtime.

Hal Gordon, coach, Leo Lamoureux yanked Gordon out of an extra forward, a move that proved to be the nearest piece of strategy of the night.

With both teams playing a man shy at the time, Pawlyshyn a double major and automatic misconduct for fighting and Winemaster a major for the same infraction, Islanders forced a face-off to the right of the Moncton cage that prompted Lamoureux's strategic move. Holding the puck in there for three hectic faceoffs, jet propelled Willie Marshall recovered the puck outside the Moncton blueline that broke up a near breakaway for Hawks, working the puck back in over the line and fed the payoff pass to Gray who made no mistake with a terrific screened shot that beat goalie Don Lockhart cleanly, the over-worked goalie's only miscue of the night.

Having it fairly easy in the first period when Hawks outshot Islanders 10-5, Don Lockhart was nothing short of terrific in the second and third periods when Islanders all but knocked his cage down around his ears with a deluge of rubber. But he kept Islanders at bay with a performance that reached heights of greatness. Islanders fired a total of 37 shots at the cool-going custodian during those two frames and it was only Gray's blast in the dying seconds that robbed Lockhart of a shutout that he deserved to get if ever a goalie did.

Playing over heavy, wet ice, prompted by almost springlike weather and a capacity crowd, it was a grueling contest for the two clubs who were engaged in their fourth contest in one week. Play at times was ragged as a result, but at other times was fast converted for their winning edge.

The English boys also brought to the playing field something that isn't seen half enough these days in amateur sport—a real sincere showing of sportsmanship. On numerous occasions during the fray, the attending fans were treated to such exhibitions in various phases, but the most noticeable of these was their spontaneous displays of hand clapping whenever any of the opposition returned to play after an injury. Such outright sportsmanship is also catching. They had the Saint Dunstan's boys, who are widely noted for their good sportsmanship in athletic quarters, doing the same thing when the situation was reversed. The attending crowd too, joined in the free spirited gesture when the situation warranted it.

Woman, 94, Recalls Adventurous Career

CELEBRATING her 94th birthday here last month, Mrs. Cordelia Frances Gore can recall enough adventures to fill a book.

She has driven a covered wagon in Washington, Oregon and California; defended herself and her husband in the fields, and was shipwrecked near Whibby Island en route to Blaine in 1896, losing all her possessions and one child who suffered pneumonia.

She came to Vancouver in 1897, and her husband James died the following year. Five of her seven children are living, including two sons and three daughters, but one of the daughters is married in England and another in New York State.

Mrs. Gore lives here with her third daughter, Mrs. Jessie Fletcher, and still takes a keen interest in current affairs.

Bruins In Second Place In N. H. L.; Richard Scores 301st Goal

BOSTON 4 CHICAGO 2
CHICAGO, Nov. 4 — (CP) — Boston Bruins moved into second place in the National Hockey League tonight by taking a 4-2 before 9,862 fans.

For the first time this season the Hawks managed to get the first goal at 4:20 of the first period when Gus Bodnar, assisted by Pete Horek and Pete Babando, hammered one past goalie Jim Henry.

The edge didn't last long, however. At 12:16, with the Hawks short-handed due to a tripping penalty to Lee Fogolin, Adam Brown converted a George Sullivan-Johnny Peirson relay into the tying goal. Two minutes and 43 seconds later the Bruins took a 2-1 lead on Sandford's shot.

Boston made it 3-1 in the second period when the Hawks had an advantage in manpower. Milt Schmidt grabbed a loose puck and soloed in for a goal. Ray Conacher got the final Hawk score on assists by Horek and Bodnar.

The clincher goal for Boston occurred at 18:25 of the third after Harry Lumley was taken out of the nets. Peirson and Schmidt got the puck and then Brown whipped the final pass into the nets.

DETROIT 3, MONTREAL 2
MONTREAL, Nov. 4 — (CP) — Maurice (The Rocket) Richard went over the 300-goal mark Saturday night although Montreal Canadiens suffered a 3-2 loss at the hands of Detroit Red Wings in their National Hockey League game here.

The full-house crowd of 14,524 went wild when Richard connected with two goals to boost his lifetime N. H. L. output to 301.

The taciturn Richard broke through for his first one at the six-minute mark of the first period. The other came at 3:05 of the third and left him only 23 goals short of Nels Stewart's record of 324. Stewart set the mark during 15 years of action with Montreal Maroons and New York Americans.
