MONDAY
Mr. R. P. Hartley, Regional Superintendent of the Canadian National Employment Service, after concluding an inspection trip to the local offices in Summerside and Charlottetown, returned to his home office at Moncton on Saturday.

Patients at the Sanatorium moved into a new environment for a brief half hour on Saturday afternoon when the R. C. M. P. band, as a final gesture of goodwill to Charlottetown, enlivened the routine of Hospital life by giving a concert on the lawn.

Hon. Francis Michael Forde, Australian High Commissioner to Canada, will arrive here this morning to spend a day becoming acquainted with this Province, according to information received by Premier Jones on Saturday.

Len O'Meara, 30-year-old horse racing driver from Alberton this year won the British Consols Trophy donated annually by the Macdonald Tobacco Company to the leading driver during Old Home Week's racing program.

O'Meara piled up a total of 77 points in winning the coveted award. His nearest competitor was Worrell Lewis of Glace Bay with 63 points.

The trophy was presented to O'Meara Saturday night by Mr. H. J. Kennedy, manager of the Exhibition Association.

Rev. D. A. Kerr, Cornwall, Ontario, former padre with the 9th Highland Brigade of the Third Division of the Canadian Army, left over the weekend on return following a holiday spent here renewing old acquaintances.

Honorary Capt. Kerr was with the Brigade from its formation and served in Northwest Europe from early in the invasion until the end of the war.

During his motor trip here he was accompanied by his mother and sister, also of Ontario.

The annual Maritime Ladies Golf Tournament gets underway here this morning with 65 lady golfers teeing-off in what is probably the biggest meet of its kind ever staged in the Maritimes and definitely the biggest ladies meet since before the war.

And on hand to defend the Maritime title which she won last year is Mrs. E. M. Hodson of Halifax. Mrs. Hodson is one of the 50 mainland ladies who will be taking part in the competitions. There are 15 ladies from the local club competing.

Old Home Week's racing program came to an end here Saturday night with Jo Jo Spencer, a sleek, fast pacer owned by Norman Acker of St. Stephen, New Brunswick, emerging as the only double heat winner on the card.

Jo Jo paced two fast miles to win the sixth and tenth dashes from a field of speedy performers. William Birt drove him both times. He won the first mile in 2:11 flat and the second in 2:12 1-5.

Other winners at the well-attended meet were Rajah Hanover, Col. Hanford, Annister, Dinet, Ann Boy, Miss Donna Mae, Proctor's Old and Mann's Dream.

The old dam site opposite Charlottetown, formerly owned by Mr. A. E. Morrison and located just west of the Southport wharf has been rebuilt and remodelled on 1952 lines.

Following the trend of the times a "by pass" had been dug inviting the waters of the river to flow in spring-fed land-locked waters of the dam.

The owners, Messrs. Sterling McKay and Willard Jordan have purchased additional land adjoining the pond, and will carry out a general program of improvement as time goes along.

The dam is really the sea front exit for the Government hatchery pond located on the Keppoch Road, and the waters of the hatchery spill over into a stream flowing into the constructed dam.

Carcasses as good as those entered in the Brethour Trophy competition at the Royal Winter Fair at Toronto last year were on display in a special competition sponsored by Canada Packers Limited during the Exhibition last week.

Winning first place was a carcass, presented by Kenneth MacNeil, Clyde River. The grand dam of this animal was a sow owned by Mr. Winders Bell, South Melville, and is the only sow in Canada to have a slaughter test score of 95 in Advanced Registry. A carcass shown by Harrison Green, Clyde River, won second honors, while the third place went to Col. F. I. Andrew. The latter animal was sired by the boar which was judged grand champion at the Exhibition this year. The fourth place went to Frank McInnis with an animal sired by the grand champion of the Amherst show last fall, William Found, Long River, and S. C. Stewart and Son, Marshfield, had the fifth and sixth places winners.

Death came peacefully yesterday morning at the Prince County Hospital to Ernest S. (Ike) Wright in his 49th year. Although for some years he had been in ill health and had undergone surgical operations and despite the best medical care available he was unable to regain his good health.

He apprenticed for many years in tin-smithing, and on the completion of his apprenticeship, he opened a shop at Portune and later at Montague where he soon made many lasting friendships.

The powerful tug, Foundation Vera, arrived in Georgetown yesterday from Halifax and this morning will put a towline aboard the German freighter Hendrik Fisser in an effort to pull the latter off the reef at Burnt Point at the entrance to Georgetown Harbour.

Four women, including last year's Maritime champion, Mrs. E. M. Hodson of Halifax, remained in the running for championship honors at the end of the first day's match in the annual Maritime Ladies Golf Meet which is being staged at the Charlottetown course. The three, in addition to Mrs. Hodson, are: Miss A. Flemming of Truro; Mrs. H. P. Connor of Ashburn Golf Course, Halifax; and Mrs. Blair Gordon of Saint Andrews, New Brunswick; Mrs. Gordon is a former Maritime champion.

FRIDAY
Joseph Gabriel MacDonald, Chepstow, has been ordered confined "in jail in Queen's County in special custody" for an indeterminate period by the Lieutenant Governor-in-Council. It was announced last night following a meeting of the Cabinet of the Provincial Government.

A former Maritime titleholder Mrs. Harold P. Connor of Halifax, N. S., won the Maritime Ladies Golf Championship here yesterday afternoon by defeating Miss Anne Flemming of Truro, N. S. three and two in the 36 hole final match.

An electrician, Kane has been working with the Good Electric Company of Charlottetown. He will work as an electrician with the mainland company in Newfoundland.

"Pig in a Poke," a play written by a well-known Canadian author, Catherine Brinkenden, who has several times visited this Province as the guest of Premier and Mrs. Jones, is to be the opening production of the Little Theatre Guild. This decision was reached at a meeting of the Little Theatre executive held last night. Mrs. E. S. Leiding and Mr. Arthur MacLean will be the co-directors of this production, which is scheduled for presentation early in October.

A total of 16 cases of poliomyelitis have been reported in this Province so far this year, but Dr. O. H. Curtis, Chief Health Officer, stated that most of them were very mild. There was one death early in the year.

The great majority of the cases so far have been in the western and eastern parts of Prince Edward Island with only two cases in Queen's County. The total is said to be about the same as last year. Though it is higher than other years prior to 1951, this is due to a better reporting of cases by physicians. Now they are more inclined to report all cases which resemble polio.

A net loss of slightly over \$10,000 for the year's operations was reported by the P. E. I. Potato Growers Association at the annual meeting held yesterday in the Canadian Legion Hall. At the same time the secretary stated that over \$17,000 in uncollectible debts had been written off. They had been on the books for several years and in many cases those owing had since died or left the Province.

Three new directors, one for each County, were elected to replace those retiring under the regulations. The new men elected were Messrs Horace Wright, Junlor, Bedeque, for Prince County; Blythe Howatt, New Willshire, for Queens County; and James McCallum, Georgetown, for King's. At the same time Mr. George Saville, M. L. A., who had been named by the directors last year to fill an unexpired term, was elected a director for King's County.
