Former Turk Pays Income Taxes Without Murmur

VANCOUVER, Nov. 20 (CP)—Turkish-born Vahan Tashdjan, owner of a Persian art store here, today accepted a ruling of the Income Tax Appeal Board that will cost him many thousands of dollars.

"I will not argue with the decision of my loving Canada," he said. "I shall never contradict the judgment of my country. It involves our integrity, our way of life."

A naturalized Canadian for 27 years, Tashdjan has been ordered to pay income tax on \$52,924 which he claimed he won in three years of playing the horses.

The board ruled in Ottawa that Tashdjan had not provided corroboration for his story that his large bank deposits came from race-track winnings. Normally, horse racing and other wagers are not subject to income tax.

But in New York today Arcadio denied the friendship and called the story "fantastic."

Tashdjan had made bank deposits of 19,582 in 1945, 15,877 in 1946 and \$17,465 in 1947. He had shown a taxable income of only \$4,814 in 1946 and \$920 in 1947.
