Strange But True

The British Chamber of Commerce in Shanghai observes Seventeen bank holidays. Some of the firms close at one o'clock during the summer months of July and August, so that during the year their offices are open for business less than 1,500 hours. British banks in this city open at 10 A. M., close at noon, re-open at two P. M., and close at three except on Wednesdays, which is a half holiday, making a total of 864 hours for the year, without taking summer holidays into account—a banker's paradise!

Men and women who are blind or deaf develop compensating faculties which are very noticeable in the individual. Indeed, in many ways they show a superior intelligence than their literate brethren. The man who gets along in life successfully without the mental paper saving devices of pencil and paper has to make good use of his brain.

One of the most intelligent men I know is an illiterate carpenter who, in the routine of his daily work, performs mental feats that are almost uncanny. For example, he can compute quickly and accurately the cost of any job of work and, if you are curious about details, can tell you within a few pounds how many nails it will take to build a certain type of home.

This is made possible by observations. He makes a mental photograph of all the people he works with, and can name them all. Due to illness in his younger days he never went to school, and has no opportunity to read and write, he had to learn the "how of things" in other ways. There are thousands in the world who are just like him.

According to the English poultry periodical, "Poultry Farmer", students attending an instructive course at the Japan Chick Sexing Association school were able to sex 340 chicks every hour after 50 hours practice. This was made possible by a new chick sexing machine invented by the Japanese, pioneers in the art of chick sexing. Jap operators can sex 600 chicks per hour with 100 per cent accuracy. The operator holds a projector lamp fitted with a small glass tube which is inserted into the chick's vent. This illuminates the bird's interior which the operator views through an optical eye piece. In pullet chicks, the ovary can be seen, while the testicle can be spotted in a male bird.

Thousands of British Columbia salmon have been tagged and turned loose in the study of spawning habits and migrations.

The Nova Mink Ltd., of Masquodouit Harbor, N. S., are about to sell its assets to satisfy a claim for cost in suing T. C. A. for scaring the wits out of a mother mink so that she became excited and ate her offspring. A Supreme Court jury favored the mink ranch; but the full branch of the Supreme Court reversed the decision and ordered the mink owners to pay costs amounting to \$1016.

Out on the prairie, a farmer is claiming damages from the city of Saskatchewan for loss caused to his wheat crop by rats. The farm is just north of the city limits.
