Wonder If Russia's Power To Wage Atomic War Being Cut

By THE CANADIAN PRESS Russia's announced decision to reduce her armed forces by 1,200,000 received a cautious welcome in the West Tuesday. But some experts raised questions about whether the cut would materially reduce the Soviet Union's power to wage atomic war.

Norwegian Foreign Minister Halvard Lange, while welcoming the move, said in a speech to Parliament in Oslo that the announcement must be viewed in the light of modern developments in the field of intercontinental weapons and other new arms. It is obvious, he said, that the character of the new weapons has made necessary considerable changes in the structure of Russia's forces.

At a senate sub-committee hearing in Washington, U.S. Air Force Secretary Donald Quarles

and Air Force chief of staff Ben Nathan Twining urged that Soviet announcement be treated with extreme caution until all the facts are known. **NO CUT IN PLANES** Quarles said only 30,000 of the 1,200,000 men to be cut are from Russian air divisions. Twining said he saw no indication the Russians were cutting aircraft production.

U. S. State Secretary Dulles told a press conference the United States "welcomes the Soviet announcement of its intention to reduce its armed forces by 1,200,000 men within the next year, if this proves to be evidence of an intent to forgo the use of force in international affairs." The British foreign office, welcoming the Russian move, emphasized that Russia is only doing now what the Western powers did immediately after the Second World War.

NEW SCHEME TO PAY FOR HOME

TORONTO (CP)—Staff Inspector George Elliott told the Toronto police commission Thursday that a man, buying his own home, commuted from Oshawa in a taxi to beg \$40 a day in Toronto streets. The inspector said that the man, married, with four children, operated three months in front of a department store. He was seen to leave a taxi in the morning, and returned to Oshawa 30 miles away, by bus. He made begging a full-time business.

Stormy Towing Job Is Ended
HALIFAX (CP) — A stormy three-week ocean towing job ended Thursday when the tug Gele Ze pulled the new lake-type freighter Lachinodoc into port.

The 573-ton Rotterdam tug began the tow in England's Bristol channel and for most of the trans-Atlantic journey the ships fought big winds and heavy seas. Capt. Adrian Silg of the Gele Ze said the "for seven days we just pitched and rolled and were driven southward from our course." But the tow line held.

The Lachinodoc was towed here by propellers installed. She will sail on her own power from here to the Great Lakes where she will be operated by the Paterson Steamship Company.

Inquest Held In Drowning Of North Lake Man

We find that no blame can be attached to any person or persons and in our opinion death was accidental," was the verdict brought in by the Coroner's jury empaneled by Dr. G. S. A. Inman of Montague at the inquest

held in Souris Town Hall yesterday afternoon. Mr. J. P. Nicholson, Charlottetown, appeared for the Crown. The following witnesses were heard: Leland MacDonald, South Lake; Elwin Fisher, uncle of the deceased, with whom the victim resided; George Gillis, South Lake; Alfred Fisher, brother of the deceased and Earl S. MacVane of Bothwell who found the body. A report by the Provincial Pathologist, Dr. J. H. Shaw was read by the Coroner. The jury in the retired and returned with the above verdict.
