THE STANLEY left here for Picton this morning at 7 o'clock. She had a large number of passengers and a good freight, mostly of light or nine horses.

THE FOREIGN MAIL will be due in Charlottetown at 3.15 this afternoon. The boats crossed yesterday, and the mail reached the city about half past five in the afternoon.

POUR COURT - This morning, John Mallet, Queen Street, was fined \$25 and costs to two months imprisonment for selling intoxicants in a room having more than one entrance or exit.

JOE LANNON WINS - Joe Lannon, plaintiff in the suit for \$5,000 against champion Corbett for breach of contract in failing to appear at Lannon's benefit in Boston about a year ago, was given a verdict for \$500 a few days ago.

THE BARNARD SYNDICATE - A late issue of the Daily Chronicle, published at Georgetown, British Guiana, says: "The gold entered at the Department of Mines yesterday amounted to 202 ozs., 4 dwt., 2 grs. The latest amount was 196 ozs., 2 dwt., 7 grs., to the Barnard Syndicate from the Maranui." Captain W. H. Barnard and his brother are the principal owners of the Barnard Syndicate.

HEAVY WEATHER - A terrible cyclone struck Longview, Tex., on Saturday night causing great damage to property and loss of life. Ten persons are known to have been killed. The storm was accompanied by rain and hail. Half stones weighing from fifteen to eighteen ounces fell with such force as to destroy buildings, trees and shrubs. Reports were received from the place that the effect there was to have killed outright there. At Trackham, Mrs. Watson and four children were killed and Mr. Watson fatally hurt.

AN ISLANDER DEAD - The Gloucester, Mass., Daily Times contains an obituary notice of Mr. Augustus White, photographer, who died at that place lately of heart disease after an attack of the grip. Mr. White was a native of Hallow Bay, in this Province, and left there for Gloucester about thirty years ago. He learned photography with Mr. Josiah Goddard, and after the removal of that gentleman from the place he soon became sole proprietor. Mr. White was for 25 years the sexton of St. Ann's Roman Catholic Church, and was a man universally esteemed. A wife, five sons and a daughter survive him.

THAT INCENDIARY FIRE - A late Halifax despatch says: John Lewis and Samuel Lewis, his son, charged with firing a store on Upper Water Street to defraud the Bank of Nova Scotia of \$4,000, were acquitted to-day by Judge Johnston. Lewis was arrested on the evidence of his clerk, Reyno, who alleged Lewis promised him \$50 to set the fire. Lewis was a Jew and there was much rejoicing among the Jewish people when the verdict was announced. Much interest was manifested by the citizens generally, and particularly the insurance people. The decision of the court was a surprise to many, but others expected it. John Reyno, who turned informer, was the principal witness. Reyno is still in jail.

MR. DOULL'S LECTURE - Mr. W. P. Doull delivered a very interesting and instructive lecture on "Electricity" before the Cabot Club on Saturday evening last. The lecturer presented the subject in its practical aspect, more especially as applied to light, telegraph, telephone and electric welding. Several questions were asked and answered to the satisfaction of all. A hearty vote of thanks, moved by Mr. Donald McKenzie, Jr., and seconded by Mr. P. Dughierty, was carried unanimously and tendered the popular lecturer. The attendance of members and friends was very large. Mr. J. M. Nicholson occupied the chair.

ST. PATRICK'S DAY - The festival of Ireland's Patron Saint was celebrated in New York on a greater scale than ever this year. The day was bright and fine and the green flag and the shamrock were seen everywhere. It is stated that there were from 5,000 to 10,000 in line when the procession of Irish Societies started. In the evening the Friendly Sons of St. Patrick had their banquet at Delmonico's. About two hundred and fifty guests sat down. Mr. James Jeffrey Roche, editor of the Boston Pilot, was one of the speakers, responding to the toast of "The Press". The Morning Journal says: He (Mr. Roche) was received with cheers and gave a dramatic sketch of the power of the press, its necessities as an educator, its conductors, and its growing influence. MEETING OF PRESBYTERY.

The Presbytery of Prince Edward Island met on Tuesday, March 20th, and was constituted with praise and prayer. Rev. J. K. Fraser, of Alberton, was Moderator.

A notification was read from the Presbytery of Pictou, expressing their intention of applying to the next General Assembly for leave to receive as a minister Rev. Willard P. Anderson, formerly a minister of the Baptist Church. Also a notification to the same effect from the Presbytery of London, in behalf of Rev. Robert Aylward, B. A. member of the Congregational Union.

The following Commissioners were appointed to the General Assembly, which meets in St. John, N. B., June 13th: Revs. R. Maclean, J. W. Mackenzie, J. R. Coffin, T. F. Fullerton, W. P. Archibald, Cameron, D. Sutherland, and Messrs. George B. H. T. C. James, W. H. Brown, George Simpson, Archibald Currie, J. A. Maclean, and Hons. D. Laird and Benjamin Rogers, Elders.

Messrs. N. Shaw and J. J. McLeod were heard as commissioners from the congregation of Tryon and Bonshaw, whereupon it was moved that Mr. J. F. McCarty be appointed as ordained missionary for one year.

Mr. Spencer's resignation of the pastoral charge of Montserrat was taken up, and, after hearing representatives from the congregation, entreating his retention, Mr. Spencer asked leave to withdraw his resignation, whereupon it was resolved "that Mr. Spencer be allowed to withdraw his resignation, and the congregation be congratulated on their standing as shown by petition."

The Presbytery agreed to make application to the Augmentation Fund for the following grants: Elmisdale, Tignish and Montrose, \$150; Georgetown, \$150; Woodville, \$125; Murray Harbor South, \$75; Caledon, \$100; Dunbar, \$250. The Gregor request was ordered to be allocated as follows: Foreign missions, \$100; home missions, \$50; augmentation scheme, \$50.

T. C. James presented the report on statistics, which was received and adopted and the diligence of the committee commended.

Mr. J. K. Fraser presented the report on sabbath schools. He also reported a deficit on the expenses of the Assembly's Committee, and stated that the sum of \$61.90 was allocated to this Presbytery. The Governor of Sunday School was instructed to bring the matter to the notice of the various sessions.

Mr. John A. Lawson was heard as a delegate from the Temperance Convention then assembled, inviting the Presbytery to attend the 90th celebration of the anniversary of Neal Dox. The invitation was accepted.

Rev. W. A. Mason presented the report on "Temperance," which was adopted. A number of questions were then submitted for answer from the General Assembly committee on Sabbath observance, and the clerk was instructed regarding the answers.

Rev. J. M. McLeod presented the report on "Systematic Beneficence," and Rev. D. Sutherland the report on the "State of Religion," both of which were adopted.

Arrangements were then made for the induction of Rev. G. M. Dill to the pastoral chair of Summerside. Presbytery stands adjourned to meet at the call of the clerk.

NEWS NOTES.

Montreal Street Railway has increased its capital from \$2,000,000 to \$4,000,000.

Rich strikes of gold are reported at Ballarat, Victoria, Australia. A great rush for the new fields has set in.

The Irish Times, in an editorial upon the proposed Canadian fast Atlantic mail service, says the development of the undertaking will be watched in Ireland with great vigilance, and, our contemporary adds, "an earnest practical design."

The amount of gold and paper currency per head in New South Wales is £9 3s 3d, against £7 in the United States, £4 8s in the United Kingdom, and £2 in Canada. The only country which has a higher average than New South Wales is France, where the amount is £11 16s per head.

An understanding reached between the Vatican and the French Government has accelerated the death of the monarchical cause in France. The Comte de Paris, recognizing the utter hopelessness of the monarchical principle, has at last cut off his agents, the subsidies which he has been paying to newspapers and other influences which have helped to keep him favorable before the public.

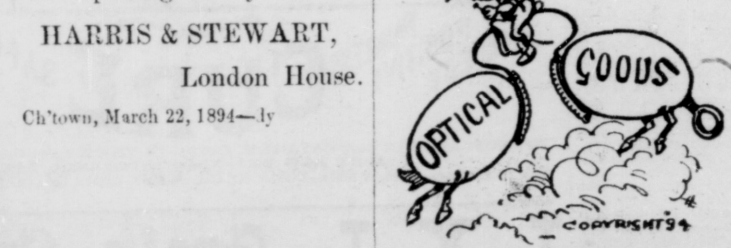
