RCMP Patrol Cars To Have Seat Belts

All Royal Canadian Mounted Police patrol cars on Prince Edward Island will eventually be equipped with safety belts, Insp. A.S. McNeil, said yesterday.

The first of the belts have already been installed in the front seats of some cars, he said, and all new patrols received by the RCMP will be equipped with them.

Insp. McNeil, who feels strongly on the great safety factor involved in the installation of seat belts, said, "we are trying to set an example" and he hoped the general public would follow the example.

He feels that if the idea is generally accepted in the province the seat belts would lower the highway fatality toll considerably.

Weather permitting, construction will begin today on the new Kinross-Macouche Rural Regional High School, to be located in Miscouche.

Superintendent Currie, provincial minister of education, yesterday turned the first sod, to "officially" get the project underway.

Due to inclement weather, most of the ceremonies were conducted in the Miscouche High School basement. Ralph McCurville, Kinross, presided.

"I know you have done lots of planning and preparation in looking forward to the day when the high school would become a reality," said Dr. Dewar as he turned the first spadeful of earth.

"As I go through the province, I attend several school closings, and I sometimes wonder if things are going all right," said the minister, "but education, but when a school opens again in the fall, I get enthusiastic all over again for the people" in attendance for the ceremonies. "This is the greatest day in the life of a community at any time of year," he said. He stated it was his hope that the school would be a source of inspiration and encouragement to see people so interested in the growth and development of their community that they could now look forward to the day when their school could use the new classrooms and facilities of the school.

Referring to the project, Dr. Dewar concluded, "don't listen to anyone who says it can't be done" and glad you have taken a stand like Christopher Columbus—there are always winners.

Rev. John Kelly thanked Dr. Dewar and his department for attending the school and for the splendid display of co-operation with a number of other communities in the province.

"When erected as a lasting monument to the youth education and government of the province," he stated.

Ben DesRoches and Raymond Brown, representing the Miscouche unit of the new proposed high school, also spoke briefly.

Mr. DesRoches lauded Dr. Robert McNeil and Hon. Henry Wedge, both of whom were unavoidably absent for the general support and interest in favour of the new high school when it was still in the planning stages.

"Today we have reached a milestone in the construction of our high school," said Ben DesRoches, "but our work would have been in vain were it not for the co-operation received from the department of education through Dr. Dewar, and also Dr. McNeil and Hon. Henry Wedge."

Mr. DesRoches noted that the high school would be beneficial to all areas served by it.

Liquor Prices Unchanged

Provincial Treasurer Melvin McQuaid said yesterday that he foresees no increase in liquor and many provinces have already increased their prices.

Mr. McQuaid said the government may be able to absorb the increase so that it will not be passed on to the consumer. He estimated the increase on imported liquors to be about 20 cents per quart.

"The government," he said, "budgeted for so much revenue from liquor sales and it is found that revenue is seriously affected. We may have to increase the price to the consumer."

Seed Potato Ageage Shows Real Decline

Preliminary 1962 figures show that 27.6 per cent of potatoes were entered for seed potato inspection in the province.

Last year's total figure was 21,228 acres and the 1962 figure is expected to approach this total when final figures are completed, according to G. C. Ramsay, district inspector for the Canada Department of Agriculture.

Totals do not include table stock potatoes.
