Sweden Begins Spy Hunt Among 40,000 Refugees

STOCKHOLM, Sept. 23—(Reuters)— Swedish security police have begun a spy hunt among the country's 40,000 refugees following the latest case of trespassing in forbidden areas.

Agents of the Swedish Aliens Commission are working with the police in the country-wide screening.

The hunt was ordered after three Polish refugees had been arrested for sailing in the forbidden waters near Nynashamn, South of Stockholm.

This is the same military area in which the Russian military attaché here was alleged to have been seen taking photographs last month—and it is the third reported case of trespassing in recent weeks.

Police said the Poles, Joseph Witulski, Antonin Piotrowski and Joseph Gallin, were found in a high-powered launch equipped with navigating instruments and charts of the Baltic showing Soviet naval bases and entry channels to the main ports of Lithuania, Latvia and Estonia.

N. S. Deputy Minister Of Trade, Industry

HALIFAX, Sept. 23—(CP)— The appointment of Dr. Robert D. Howland as Deputy Minister of Trade and Industry for Nova Scotia was announced by Hon. W. T. Dauphinee, Minister of Trade and Industry.

A native of England, Dr. Howland has been vice-chairman of the Nova Scotia Research Foundation for the last three years. He is also vice-chairman of the Industrial Assistance Advisory Board and chairman of the Inter-Departmental Committee of Aerial Photography for the Province.

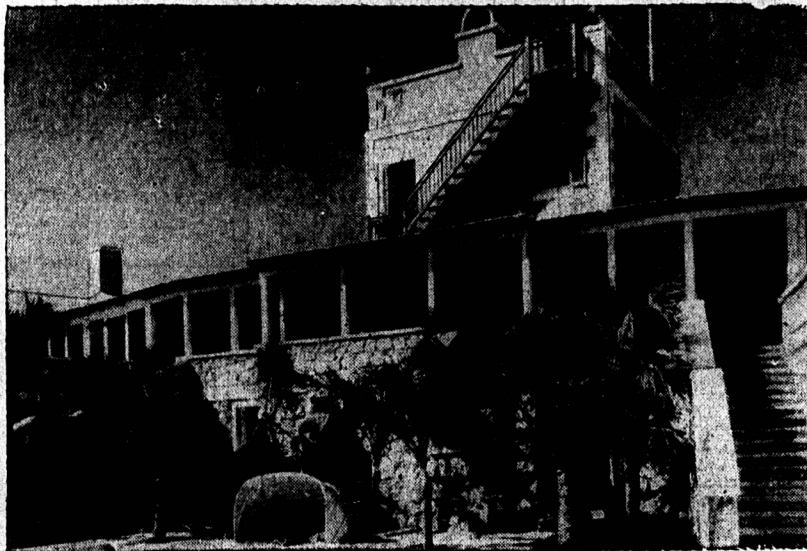
Two Children Burned To Death

MONTBURN, Que., Sept. 23—(CP)— Two children were burned to death yesterday and another later died in hospital when fire of unknown origin swept through the dwelling of their parents 25 miles north of Rouyn in Northwestern Quebec.

Burned in their home were Guy, 4, and Solanges, nine months. Francis, 3, died later in hospital in nearby Noranda. They were children of Mr. and Mrs. Richard Drapeau.

Investigation Uncovers Further Clues in Murder of Sir Harry Oakes

After questioning a woman at Ft. Lauderdale, Fla., police have uncovered names of the man believed to have killed Sir Harry Oakes seven years ago. Millionaire was bludgeoned to death in the bedroom of his Nassau home in 1943. The investigation was touched off last week when 31-year-old mechanic Edward Majava of Oakland, Cal., a chef on a boat in Nassau harbour at time of murder, told police he knew the identity of the murderer having obtained it from a 'fra Hildegarde Hamilton, prominent Fort Lauderdale portrait painter. the other way round. She refused to reveal the name, but said he lives in Nassau and is a prominent man.

Christian Church Facing Crisis

TORONTO, Sept. 23—(CP)— The principal Protestant chaplain of the R. C. A. F. declared the Christian church must "declare a state of emergency."

"Tomorrow may be too late," Group Capt. R. M. Frayne of Ottawa told the 14th general council of the United Church of Canada. He said indifference within the church to the menace from without must be outlawed. Apathy must be made a cardinal sin.

Men of the Canadian armed forces have been placed on active service. Our government didn't place these men on active service as a goodwill gesture. If the Christian church ever needed to declare a state of emergency, the time is today.

Communism threatens to encircle and stifle Christian life, he said.

"As Christians, we believe in peace—but not peace at the price of conviction—all around Christian life is an encircling movement which will press tighter and tighter until the last vestige of Christian liberty would cease to pulse."

Capt. Frayne said more than 80 per cent of Canadian boys between 14 and 18, serving with cadet units, are receiving no religious training. He based his estimate on a survey of air and army cadet camps taken this summer.

It showed that although 90 per cent attended Sunday School during early years, 60 per cent now were out of touch with any Protestant church or an affiliated youth group.

"Yet these are the boys on the verge of manhood's morning to whom we may have to say, 'Now boys, it's your turn.'"
