TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER. Benevolent Societies.

OTTAWA, JAN. 12.

An act to incorporate benevolent societies with special privileges, was introduced last session, and withdrawn on the understanding that the Government would in the interim, inquire into the subject with a view to the introduction of a Government measure covering the desired points. As the Imperial Government are preparing important amendments to the Friendly Societies Act it has been deemed advisable to await this improved legislation before introducing any measure here. It is therefore improbable that the promised measure will be submitted this session.

What England Demands.

LONDON, JAN. 11.

It is reported in the lobbies of the Chamber of Peers that England's demands are: the maintenance of status quo, abandonment of all Portuguese pretence to Nyassa Highlands and concession of the right of way by river and overland from Nyassa Land to the sea. It is probable that the Cabinet will resign if unable to arrive at a settlement.

A Brutal Murder.

TORONTO, JAN. 12.

Inquiry into the death of Miss Jane S. Piers confirms the impression first formed that the affair is one of the most foul and brutal murders Toronto has ever seen. All idea of suicide is utterly precluded, the investigation having shown that the skull of the deceased was fractured and one leg broken.

No Appointment.

LONDON, ONT., JAN. 11.

The Free Press is informed on good authority that no appointment will be made by the Methodist General Conference Special Committee to fill the vacancy in the general superintendency occasioned by the death of Dr. Williams.

Getting Up in Years.

OTTAWA, JAN. 12.

The veteran Premier celebrated his seventy-fifth anniversary yesterday and received telegraphic congratulations from Lord Knutsford and dozens of other distinguished friends in various parts of the Empire.

Warrants have been sworn out against the Pentecost Band of Faith followers, by citizens who object to the boisterous manner of holding meetings which continue up to 2 o'clock in the morning.

Peter's Pence.

ROME, JAN. 12.

The Peter's Pence for 1889 yielded to the Pope \$30,000 less than in 1888. The legacies bequeathed to the Pope during the year amounted to \$800,000.

The Dominion Live Stock Association have voted down a resolution asking a prohibitive duty on dressed meat imported from the States.
