Home Economics Congress Will Be Held In Maryland

Mr. Carlos P. Romulo, Philippine ambassador to the United States, will be the keynote speaker at the ninth international congress on Home Economics to be held July 28 to August 2, 1958 on the campus of Maryland University, USA. More than 1,000 delegates to the congress, representing some 33 countries, will hear Mr. Romulo speak at the opening plenary session of the congress. As former leader of the Philippine delegation to the United Nations, Mr. Romulo is well qualified to deal with his subject "The Social and Economic Problems of the World Today." During the week of meetings, home economists from more than a dozen different countries will speak on subjects related to the congress theme, "Education in Home Economics Relative to the Social and Economic Conditions of Individual Countries." Both the Canadian and American Home Economics Associations will be hostesses for the congress which is sponsored by the International Federation of Home Economics. Federation headquarters is in Paris. A pre-congress tour in the United States and post-congress tour in Canada have been planned to show visitors from outside North America how and where home economists work in the two countries. Since this is the first time in the 50-year history of the federation that the congress is being held in North America, delegates from abroad will be eager to see the role home economics plays in the United States and Canada. Miss Mildred Horton, executive secretary of the American Home Economics Association, has been named congress director.

Eggs Add Richness To Various Potato Recipes

By IDA BAILEY ALLEN "Madame, you are certainly having a ball," chuckled the Chef. "I come into the test-kitchen and find you making potato frills."

"Why not, Chef?" I asked. "Mashed potato frills can doll up almost any entree and furnish a vegetable at the same time. And mashed potato is so easy to make with instant potato. Just two minutes to combine, and there's a whole quart of fluffy potato ready to use."

"How do you like my planked striped bass?" "Very nice with the potato frill edging," smiled the Chef. "evidently you pastry-tubed this with a rose tube. Did you beat some egg yolks into the mashed potato to help it into 'Duchesse'?" Very good, Madame. The egg yolks add richness and will make the potato brown more quickly.

"Here are potato rosettes, Chef, that I made from the same Duchesse combination. I pastry-tubed them on cookie sheets and browned them in a hot oven. They are nice and hot."

Tomorrow's Dinner Spinach - lettuce tossed salad, Planked striped bass, Duchesse potato, Grilled tomato, Lemon custard pie, Coffee, tea, milk.

All measurements are level; recipes proportioned to serve 4 to 6.

Planked Striped Bass: Use a 2 to 3 lb. striped bass, shad, whitefish, mackerel, or bluefish. Clean, wash, drain and dry; split and debone if desired.

Season the fish inside and out with salt, pepper, 1 tsp. powdered dill and 1 tsp. monosodium glutamate.

Heat a large wooden fish plank or heat - proof baking platter. Brush with oil. Place the fish on plank or platter.

Bake 25 min., or until it begins to flake, in a moderately hot oven, 375 degrees F. Baste twice with 2 tbsp. butter or margarine melted with 1 tbsp. lemon juice.

Remove the fish plank to a table and, using a pastry-tube, border the fish and the edge of the plank or platter with Duchesse potato. Return to the oven for about 8 min. to brown.

Brush quarters of fresh tomato with corn oil. Dust with salt, pepper, a little oregano and broil.

Place between the spaces in the potato edgings. Garnish with half-moons of lemon and small slices of maitre d'butier. Trim with parsley or cress.

Trick of the Chef: Add a few slivers of smoked cheese when tossing a green salad for special flavor.
