The Cholera.

HAMBURG, Sept. 27. There were 72 new cases of cholera here yesterday. Up to Saturday there had been a total of 17,157 cases in Hamburg.

ST. PETERSBURG, Sept. 27. Official cholera returns for yesterday give 17 new cases and 10 deaths.

HAVRE, Sept. 27. Four new cases of cholera were reported here yesterday and five deaths.

VIENNA, Sept. 27. Cholera is said to be spreading in Roumania, and especially in the district of Carjers.
