Will Propose Retention Of Commonwealth Trade Plan

OTTAWA (CP)—Canada will propose retention of the existing system of Commonwealth trade preferences at the forthcoming Commonwealth trade conference, Finance Minister Fleming said tonight in his budget speech.

In a section devoted to Commonwealth trade, he told the Commons Canada will not propose a new system of preferences.

Mr. Fleming, making no direct reference to Britain's standing proposal for the gradual achievement of free trade with Canada, listed his government's objectives for the conference as these:

1. Expansion of the opportuni-

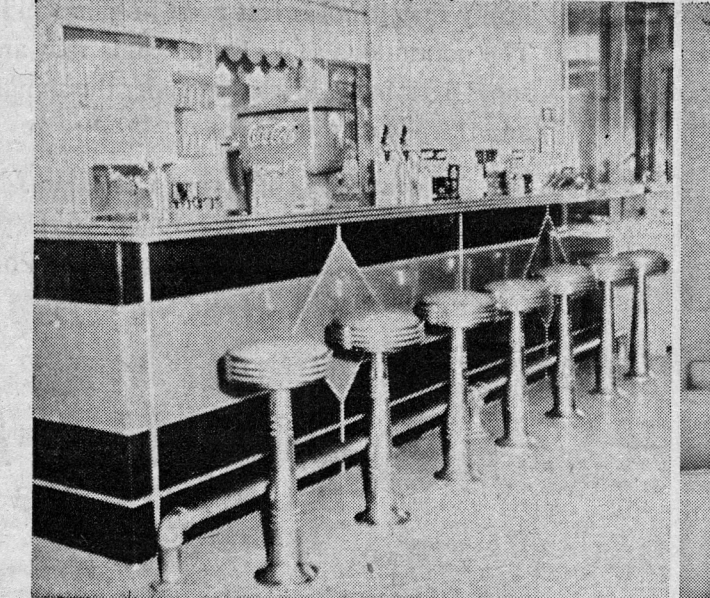
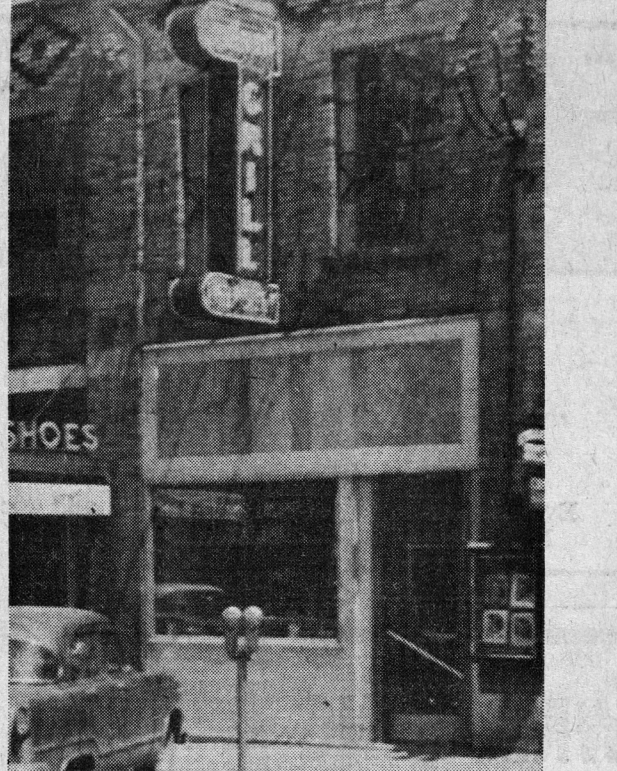

Another speed-up feature is found in the location of the coffee and tea units which have been moved up front, eliminating the loss of time experienced in serving when they were located at the rear of the establishment.

Specializing in the preparation of Chinese food by a well trained staff the Island Grill enjoys considerable patronage from tourists in addition to the regular catering to local residents. Meals and "Snacks" prepared and sent out constitute another expanding service to the public.

The Island Grill is operated by Raymond Wong who came to Canada from Canton in 1917, conducting a successful restaurant business at Yarmouth, N.S. before taking over the Island Grill, which along with the fact that all foodstuffs used is bought locally leads Mr. Wong to feel that he is making a worth-while contribution to the economy of the City and Province.
