1878.  
MY DEAR WALT WHITMAN—I am not  
overfond of letter writing. Am so over-  
burdened with correspondence that I  
neglect half of it. I am very glad to  
hear that you are so improved in health,

woods freely and have enjoyment of  
your life. As for myself, I am pretty  
well for my time of life, but somewhat  
troubled about my eyes, for I am not

the daughter of F. Locker, the author of  
"London Lyrics," in February. The

ing that you wished to have a parody of

**To Write on Glass.**  
The easiest way to write or paint on  
glass is to take a solution of fish glue  
and distribute it with a soft brush over  
the surface of the glass. Of course the  
solution must be carefully filtered, and  
when it is applied to the glass pane the  
glass must be held over a stove or lamp  
in a slanting direction to allow the sur-  
plus solution to flow off and to dry thor-  
oughly without streaking. When the  
pate has been prepared in this way, it  
is ready to write or paint upon. Even  
writing of microscopic minuteness can  
be applied to the prepared glass surface  
without the danger of the ink running.  
On this surface colors, india ink and  
any kind of pigment may be employed.
