Opening lead—nine of clubs. This hand occurred in the European championships two years ago when Ireland and Poland met in their match. The declarer, Barry O'Connell, had to combine the luck of the Irish with a fine example of skill to make his contract. The bidding was hurried, but the final contract was a reasonable one. Rozneck led his singleton club. O'Connell, playing with his brother, won in dummy with the king and eventually finessed the jack of spades, which held. After catching two more trumps, he handed West the lead with a heart. Recognizing that a ruff-discard was imminent if a heart were

continued, West shifted to the jack of diamonds. Kraymuskli ducked and South won with the queen. West's diamond return convinced O'Connell that the original club lead was a singleton, placing East still with Q-10-8. This, in turn, meant Kraymuskli had two natural club tricks coming unless one of them could be made to disappear. O'Connell led a diamond to the ten which East took with the ace. Avoiding the club suit like the plague, East returned the nine of diamonds. Declarer cashed both diamonds and led a low club from dummy. When Kraymuskli played the eight, O'Connell permitted him to win the trick. East, saddled with the lead, could find no safe return. A heart would allow declarer to dispose of his club loser as the heart was ruffed in dummy. A club lead, away from the Q-10, was equally unsatisfactory since dummy still had the jack. So the four spade contract was made. At the other table, where the North-South cards were held by the Polish pair, Czekanski and d Lowuski, the final contract was also four spades, reached by a different sequence. But the contract failed when the Polish declarer neglected to play the king of clubs on the opening lead. Ireland gained 6 international match points on the deal. The 40-board match ended in a tie between the two teams.

Merit System Needed CS Spokesman States

OTTAWA (CP)—Samuel H. S. (Sam) Hughes, who gave up a judgeship to become the new chairman of the Civil Service Commission, made clear Friday his determination to preserve the present merit system in Canada's civil service. He described the merit system—as opposed to a political patronage system—for hiring government employees as "the keystone of the whole arch of an efficient public service."

Oil Pollution Seen Threat

COPENHAGEN, Denmark (Reuters)—A Canadian marine biologist told the international conference on oil pollution of the sea which opened here Friday that pollution on the Newfoundland coast—one of the world's worst-hit areas—would get progressively worse with further use of the St. Lawrence Seaway. Leslie M. Tuck, of the Canadian government's department of northern affairs and national resources, said oil pollution of beaches and coastline was especially serious off Newfoundland, where "the routes of many ocean-going vessels converged. Most traffic routed from northern Europe, the Mediterranean and Africa to Halifax, the Great Lakes, and New England ports converged south of Cape Race on the Grand Banks of Newfoundland, he said. Oil dumped south and east of Newfoundland was carried toward the coast by prevailing winds and currents. Thousands of oiled and dying sea-birds were found along the shores of both sides of the Avalon Peninsula in the fall, winter and early spring. "My personal opinion is that this situation will get progressively worse as more ships begin to use the St. Lawrence Seaway, and the only effective method of preventing the extermination of the Arctic sea-birds which winter off Newfoundland is the complete avoidance of the discharge of persistent oils into the sea."

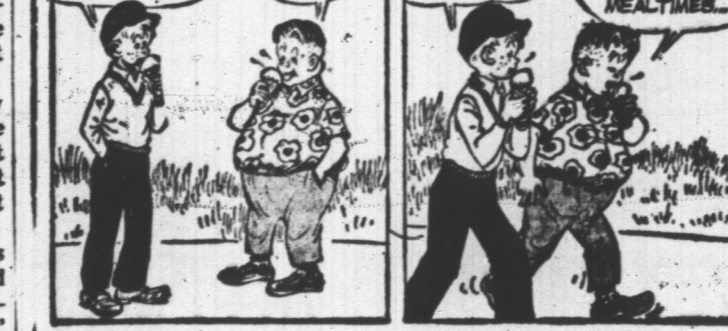

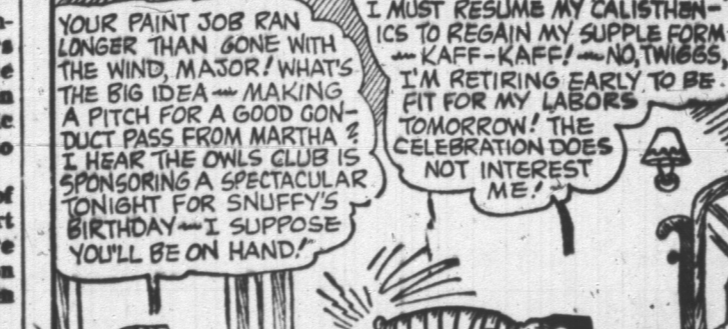
