MEETING OF PRESBYTERY.

At Charlottetown and within St. James' Hall there on Tuesday, November 6th, and at 11 o'clock, a.m., which time and place the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island met and was constituted. Mr. W. H. Smith Moderator, with whom were present Messrs Sutherland, John Gillis, Adam Guan, Stewart, Ewen Gillis, Campbell, McLeod, McLean, Fullerton, Miller, Herdman, McDonald, Craise, Robertson, McNeill and Layton Ministers, and Messrs Lawson, Laird, and Thompson Ruling Elders.

Rev J. M. McInnis, of the Presbyterian Church, of the United States, was invited to correspond.

The minutes of the meetings of August 7th and Sept. 11th were read and sustained.

Mr. D. B. McLeod introduced the following resolution which on his motion seconded by Mr. John Gillis, was unanimously adopted:

The Presbytery of Prince Edward Island recognizes the honor conferred upon it by the selection of one of its members, Rev. T. F. Fullerton, of Charlottetown, to represent the Presbyterian Church in Canada as Chaplain of the First Canadian Contingent, and also records its gratitude to God for his safe return and presence with us today after a year's service in South Africa.

Mr. Fullerton acknowledged the resolution in a few well chosen words, after which Presbytery joined in singing, "Blest be the tie that binds."

The action of the clerk in giving certificates to Messrs A. D. McKenzie and G. E. Forbes, Theological students, was approved.

Presbytery instructed Clerk to write the session of Bloomfield in reference to instructions given at last quarterly meeting.

It was agreed to allocate augmentation to the different congregations in the same way as last year.

The resignation of Mr. G. C. Robertson, of the Convener'ship of the Sabbath School Committee, was accepted, and on motion Mr. A. Critise was appointed convener.

Mr. Layton called special attention to the recommendations of the Synod re Sabbath School Work and Workers.

On motion a committee consisting of Revs. D. B. McLeod, Taylor and Adam Gunn was appointed to prepare a resolution dealing with the deepening of spiritual life in our congregations in connection with the close of the century.

In connection with home mission work it was reported to Presbytery that a catechist had been secured for Rose Valley, and that Mr. J. F. Polley had been appointed stated supply to Souris and Bay Fortune for the winter months. The Presbytery then adjourned to meet in the same place at half-past seven o'clock, of which public intimation was made and this sedent closed with the benediction.

A TRIBAL WAR.

German Corvette Takes a Hand in one on one of the Admiralty Group.

VICTORIA, B. C., Nov. 6.—The German corvette Moewe, [according to a despatch from the South Seas, has reached Sydney and reports that she had been called upon to quell a tribal war on one of the Admiralty group. Word was received by her commodore that one section of the fighters, armed with rifles from a pirate schooner, had butchered 150 natives, and the Moewe went to the scene. Arriving off the village, a landing party of 120 Germans put off under four officers, and opened fire on the rebellious natives. The natives made a stubborn stand, and returned the fire of the landing party. Fortunately, their aim was bad, and only three casualties resulted. Six of the natives were shot down. Eventually the expedition returned to the warship, which steamed close into the beach and shelled the village with disastrous results.

SOME details of the bribery of Hollander officials by the late Boer Government have come out in the enquiry now going on at Bloemfontein. It was known before that Dr. Leyds carried water on both shoulders, and now we have some more details of the bribes he received. The evidence was given by Mr. Vorstmann, agent of Kruger's dynamite monopoly. Three bribes were mentioned, which aggregated between fifty and sixty thousand dollars. The receiver was the same man who has been shining in Europe as a roving diplomat and patriot, par excellence, though his country was not the Transvaal, but Holland. He and the rings with which he was confederated, practically controlled the finances of another country and especially of the Transvaal, in the interest of themselves and their associates. Being neutrals did not prevent their fighting side by side with the Boers.
