

Local and Other Items.

The steamer Valetta arrived from Montreal to-day, with a cargo of produce and merchandise.

FRESH HERRING are very plentiful in the market to-day. They sell at from 8 to 10 cents per dozen.

A FINE lot of very cheap ROOM-PAPER opened to-day—Cheapest in the City. A few CROQUET SETS, very low. Bargains in everything at the DIAMOND BOOK-STORE.

The fine stallion "Brigham," owned by Mr. William Campbell, of Pictou, was offered for sale at Market Square to-day. The prices offered were rather small, and he still remains unsold.

A YOUNG lady named Campbell was yesterday, struck with insanity on Central Street, Summerside. She became terribly violent, and caused considerable commotion in the vicinity.

MR. JOHN P. TANTON having been requested by a large number of the citizens of Ward 4 to represent them in the City Council, will meet his friends and supporters at a meeting of the Ward at Scott's Hall, at the hour of 8 o'clock this evening.

BRIG Ella B. McLean, owned by Peake Bros. & Co., with cargo consisting of 24,250 bushels of oats, of 36 lbs. each, and 650 pieces of deals, containing 17,500 feet—superficial measure—cleared for Queenstown for orders on the 9th inst.

THE Market to-day was very large—one of the largest we have had during the past three months. Prices were as follows:—Beef (small) from 8 to 16 cts.; do (qr.) from 7 to 10. Mutton, from 10 to 14. Veal, from 4 to 8. Butter (fresh) 23 to 26; do tub, 19 to 21. Eggs, 8 to 10.

IN the market to-day we were shown some very fine bunches of rhubarb—the first of the season—which were grown by Mr. James Lewis, of St. Clair, Charlottetown Common. Some of the stalks are over fifteen inches long, and nearly two inches in circumference.

CRICKET.—We understand that the Phoenix Cricket Club's first practice for the season will take place (weather permitting) to-morrow afternoon in the Park. We hear that our cricketers intend taking a tour through New Brunswick and Nova Scotia this summer to play the leading clubs of those Provinces.

THE last deposit of \$1,000 in the Hanlan-Plaisted sculling race was posted on Monday at the "Clipper" office. The money is now all up, and will at once be forwarded to the Mayor of Toronto, the final stakeholder. The race will be rowed on the 15th inst., on Toronto Bay, and is for \$2,000 the distance being two miles straightaway.

SEVERAL complaints have been made to us about the unsafe condition of the scow used for carrying passengers and vehicles between McEwen's and McCannell's wharves—West River. It is unfit for the transfer of vehicles, and if passengers cross in it they do so at a risk of being drowned. We trust the Commission of Public Works will immediately attend to the matter and not sacrifice lives for sake of the small sum necessary to repair this scow.

IT was our painful duty yesterday to record the death of a much esteemed and respected citizen—John Haszard, Esq. He was born in Bellvue, and spent a few years in New Zealand, to which country he had gone when quite young. On his return to the Island, he engaged in business at St. Eleanor's; and, both socially and as a business man, he was deservedly respected. He was a County Magistrate and held the office of Surveyor of Shipping for Prince Edward Island.

A MOST unfeeling and brutal act was executed by a man named Cusack, on Pownal Street, yesterday evening. He was passing Mr. Wm. Murray's baking house, when a poodle made a harmless attack on him. In a moment it retreated, and when so doing, Cusack caught it by one of the hind legs and dashed it headlong against the door-step, killing it instantly. We regret to learn that there is no punishment for such heartless violence towards dumb animals, and the owner can only recover the simple value of his animal.

AT the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this morning, Mathew Lannigan and Joseph Higgins appeared on complaint of Mr. Wm. Koughan, for using abusive and threatening language towards him in his store. Lannigan was fined \$6 and costs, or one month, and Higgins was fined \$3 and costs, or 14 days; Thomas Smith appeared for obtaining money under false pretences. In this case, it appears that Smith met two little boys named Gardner and Newson, whom he sold a knife for 27 cents. They found the knife was not what Smith represented, and immediately returned it, and demanded their money. Smith took the knife and also the money, and marched off, telling them that they were "two good boys." He was imprisoned for 20 days with hard labor.

THE case of the Queen at the prosecution of Alex. C. Shaw against Donald McFadyen, for assault and battery on the person of Alex. C. Shaw, at Shaw's Wharf, West River, on Friday, the 27th ult., was tried before Theo. DesBrisay and John Brecken, Esqs.; J. P.'s for this County, this forenoon. Mr. McFadyen was convicted and fined \$16 and costs or two months imprisonment. Alexander McFadyen and Angus McEachern, for assisting Donald in the assault, were both fined \$10 or six weeks imprisonment. In addition to the above fine the three assailants were each ordered to enter into his own recognizance with two securities of \$100 each to keep the peace and be of good behavior for 12 months; and, on affidavit of one of the assailants, Mr. Shaw was also bound to keep the peace with the same conditions for the same time.

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

(Special Despatch to Examiner.)

LIVERPOOL, May 9. W. Winter Raffles, cotton broker, has suspended.

LONDON, May 9. The British steamship Chicago, 1,300 tons, from West Hartlepool for Boston, laden with soft coal, is ashore off Harwich, abandoned, and full of water, with a heavy sea running. The crew were saved.

The "Times'" criticism on the speech made by Mr. Gladstone yesterday to a deputation of the Welsh Liberals Association at Hamarden, in which he denounced the Government in violent terms, says: "His language was so reckless as to entirely overshoot the mark. It reads like a speech prompted by desperation." Two more British ironclads of the Channel squadron have arrived at Port Said.

The Birmingham Daily Post says Sir Stafford Northcote, Chancellor of the Exchequer, privately desired that Mr. Chamberlain, member for Birmingham, postpone his request for a day for discussing the motion concerning the Government's foreign policy. Hence the Post infers that the Government hopes to be able shortly to communicate information which will render the debate unnecessary.

LONDON, May 9. At the Stock Exchange this morning, Russian stocks and consuls opened strong. Activity in war preparations continues at Woolrich. There is an impression that too sanguine a view is taken of Schowaloff's visit to St. Petersburg.

NEW YORK, May 9. Leading Fenians in St. Louis yesterday, knew nothing of any movement to be made in Canada.

GENERAL NEWS.

LONDON, May 8. At Newmarket, the race for two thousand guineas was won by Pilgrimage.

BERLIN, May 8. The Emperor, yesterday, received the American Minister, Taylor.

Prince Bismarck is suffering from a return of his old neuralgic affection. The time of his return to this city is uncertain.

LONDON, May 8. Demands on charity in the strike district are already very heavy. At a meeting of the Preston Poor Law Guardians yesterday, it was stated that there had been a great increase in the number of applications for parish relief during the week. Deputations have waited upon employers at Blackburn to solicit aid for the most distressed cases. In many instances the requests were acceded to, soap and other necessities being provided.

LONDON, May 8. The Manchester Guardian points to the fact that the strike has had little effect on the cloth market, which continues singularly inactive, notwithstanding the threatened reduction of supply. This, it says, is strong evidence of the bad condition of trade.

LONDON, May 8. Two thousand guineas race sent to-day. Other horses beaten were Childeric's Oasis, Glengary, Inval, Bayonet, Buccanear's Hope, Colt and Athol Lad. Pilgrimage is not engaged in Derby, but most others are.

YOKOHAMA, May 8. An extraordinary decision of the British Court, admitting opium into Japan, still excites discussion. Foreign Envoys generally regard it as a violation of the Treaty on the part of English authorities.

LONDON, May 8. A correspondent at St. Petersburg telegraphs that the French Ambassador just from Paris, called upon the Emperor on Monday and in answer to an enquiry from the Czar as to what France would do in the event of war, Le Flo replied that France certainly would not interfere in favor of either belligerent. The Emperor was greatly offended at this remark and some ill-tempered language followed. The result was that the French Ambassador concluded the interview by saying, "France has paid sufficiently dear for the right which she now claims to steer clear of other nations' quarrels." This rejoinder was received by the Czar with such indignation that Le Flo has declared his intention to ask to be recalled.

NEW YORK, May 8. It is stated that Count Gripenberg will meet Roach and other shipbuilders in New York to-day; also that a cartridge contract was recently made by a Connecticut factory with Russia.

Negotiations are also progressing for a large number of torpedoes for the Russian navy, and that a Russian naval instructor has been working for several months in the United States shipyard as a draughtsman; also that the steamship Great Republic was sold yesterday at San Francisco to unknown parties.

One Mulligan is said to be visiting the cities between Chicago and the East, stirring up the Fenians against Canada. He was in Syracuse yesterday, and stated that 10,000 Fenians could be raised to march on Canada at thirty hours' notice.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 8. The will of W. S. O'Brien was filed in the Probate Court yesterday. The estate, as sworn to, is less than \$6,100,000, and is divided among three orphan asylums.
