Island Man Drowned In United States

The body of Archie MacLeod was brought home from Baton Rouge, Louisiana for burial at his old home in Victoria west on Tuesday. The funeral was held yesterday afternoon in the Presbyterian Church, Rev. John G. Murdoch officiating.

The late Mr. MacLeod was working for a steel construction Co., erecting a bridge across the Mississippi River and on August 24th was drowned when an accident occurred. Particulars were not available. Mr. MacLeod fell from a plank and was thrown into the river and two companions who were with him struck a boom and were instantly killed. He was accompanied home by an employee of the company, Mr. Murray. His sister, Miss Annie MacLeod, of Augusta, Maine, also came home for the funeral.

Mr. MacLeod had been in the United States for about 20 years. He was 43 years of age and unmarried. He leaves his mother, Mrs. Harriet MacLeod of Victoria, west, five brothers and four sisters, Roderick and Alexander at Victoria west; Donald at Wellington; and Sterling and Lowell at Lowell, Mass. The sisters: Jessie, Carmen, Mary and Annie all reside in the States.

FAMILY BUNK-HOUSES—ATHLONE, South Africa (CP)—One-room homes with kitchenette and two closets containing double bunks to be erected by the Cape Town City Council, will provide dwellings for persons earning \$1.44 to a week or less.

ANNOUNCED BY RADIO—That plan was announced to the German people in three separate radio broadcasts at intervals of an hour, the spokesman continued. "The message began with a short narrative of the negotiations of the last few days, in which the main point, as I interpret it, is that the British Government asked us whether we would be prepared to negotiate with the Poles."

"We replied that we were quite prepared to do so, but we did not get any answer from the Poles. Therefore, after having duly informed the British Government of the protocols for the basis of the negotiations which we intended to make, we have now published these protocols."

Because the German radio broadcast was followed by official German reports of a Polish raid on a German radio station at Gielwitz in which seven persons were said to have been killed, and British border clashes, authoritative British sources expressed concern.

During the evening High Commissioners of the several dominions met with Sir Thomas Inskip, dominions secretary.

The Government's emergency moves, which included restrictions on purchases of food and flights by civil aircraft, were regarded as indication that no solution of the crisis was yet in sight.

However, the Ministry of Health said in its announcement of Health precaution plans that the step was "precautionary and did not mean war was inevitable."

Another "precautionary" measure was the calling up of approximately 20,000 members of the Air Raid Precaution service, including the auxiliary fire service, to full-time duty.

It was announced that work on public air-raid shelters, which had been accelerated by instituting 24-hour shifts.

CALL TO COLORS—The military and naval mobilization was announced in a communication from No. 10 Downing Street after British defence ministers and other key cabinet members had reviewed the situation.

"In continuation of measures already adopted, it has been decided to complete naval mobilization and to call up the remainder of the regular reserve and supplementary reserve," the announcement said.

A further number of the Royal Air Force Volunteer Reserve also will be called up.

These steps were put into effect immediately.

A few minutes after the Communiqué was issued, the Admiralty ordered two large naval classes to report immediately without waiting for individual summonses. All other reservists and pensioners were told to await individual instructions.

The War Office, acting at the same time, ordered all officers in the Regular Army reserve and supplementary reserve to act immediately on the general instructions already in their possession.

There was no reliable estimate of the number of men involved in the new orders.

EVACUATION OF CHILDREN—The main part of the gigantic task of moving 2,000 school children, mothers and sick persons from congested areas to safer countryside today is scheduled to start tomorrow. Evacuees are carrying their personal belongings, including schoolbags of clothing, gas masks and other necessities. Children will make up about half the number of those being moved.

All transportation facilities are expected to be taxed to the utmost. "Ordinary passengers" were sharply curtailed during the evacuation. Week-end excursions were cancelled.

The London Stock Exchange announced it would close indefinitely as a result of the evacuation, since its staff would be unable to get transportation.

Council were gathered, remained a mystery.

But some Nazi leaders—first startled by Hitler's comparatively mild offer to the Poles, and then perplexed by his reluctance to deal with the border incidents sternly—were bewildered. They wondered at Berlin's hesitation.

The German news agency, D. N. B., reported an armed assault by Poles on the German radio station at Gielwitz, in which German police killed at least one.

(Earlier reports said seven had been killed.)

Puehrer, Hitler's proposals were regarded as sensational from two viewpoints:—

1. They fall far short of his unconditional demand upon Premier Daladier that Danzig and the Corridor must belong to Germany.

2. Hitler, who otherwise always has emphasized that Germany never would submit to international control, now is willing to have such bodies function both as administrators of

the Corridor during a plebiscite and for settling Poland at issue between Poland and Germany.

Following are the main points, as summarized by the official German news agency:—

1. Danzig returns immediately to Germany.

2. The Polish Corridor running from Marienwerder to Gruzdzisz, Kulm and Bydgoszcz is to be subject to a plebiscite to determine to whom it belongs.

3. Eligible to take part in the plebiscite under an international commission are all Germans, Poles and others who reside in the Corridor on Jan. 1, 1918.

The commission will be composed of Italians, Soviet Russians, French and English. All Polish soldiers and police to be withdrawn.

4. Gdynia is exempted from the plebiscite and remains Polish.

To allow ample time for a just plebiscite, this shall take place within 12 months.

5. During the period when the international commission has control of the Corridor, Germany is assured of
