Judgment Due Wednesday In Country Club Appeal Case

Judge C. St. Clair Trainor will bring down a judgment Wednesday in the Southport Country Club appeal of the Liquor Control Commission's decision to revoke the club's permit for the purchase and possession of beer and spirits.

Allison M. Gillis, representing the club, called Ralph H. Christ-

Alden Gordon all of Murray Harbor, when they were in the club on the evening of Dec. 7. If they had been drinking on club premises at all, said Mr. Christ, it had to be something they had tried again and again to get the four men to leave the club without a scene. Eventually the four did leave, he said.
