Evangelistic Team To Lead Trinity Mission

Beginning a week long evangelistic mission at Trinity Church Charlottetown starting on Sunday evening, September 21 will be Rev. Tommy Tyson of Goldboro, North Carolina and Rev. Jim Jones of Vancouver, North Carolina. The team of American evangelists are no strangers to Prince Edward Island. Both of them participated in the Conference for men at Stanhope last year and Mr. Jones is presently completing a four week mission which saw him preach at Alberton, Kensington, Montague and Mount Stewart. Mr. Tommy Tyson has five brothers in the ministry of the Methodist Church. His father was a minister and his mother's father was a minister. Mr. Tyson is in full time evangelistic work for the Carolina Conference of the Methodist Church. He is much sought after as a camp leader at prayer retreats sponsored by the Camps Farthest Out movement in the United States and more recently in Canada. In this work Mr. Tyson has been associated with such noted religious leaders as the late Glenn Clark, Frank Laubach, E. Stanley Jones and Thomas Car-

ruth, well known for his efforts in uniting the world in prayer. Mr. Tyson is a powerful speaker who emphasizes the Gospel of Love. His work has taken him to many of the principal cities of the United States. Churches in the areas adjoining Charlottetown will participate in the mission by contributing special numbers each evening. The singing of the old time gospel hymns will be led by Rev. Robert Latimer, Assistant Minister at Trinity. Guest artists will be appearing on the program each night of the mission. While the mission is being sponsored by the United Church it is pointed out that no stress will be placed on denominationalism. Persons making decisions will be referred to the Church of their choice.

"Fundy", Potato Variety, Will Be Available This Fall

The Canada Department of Agriculture, through the National Potato Breeding Project, Experimental Farm, Fredericton, N.B. is releasing a new variety of potatoes named "Fundy" for distribution in N.B., N.S., and P.E. I. This variety is being multiplied in the Province at the present time and a reasonable quantity of seed will be available for distribution this fall. Fundy is a smooth white potato of Irish Cobbler season about equal to that variety in yield and is of high cooking quality. Owing to these qualities it may be marketed both as an early and a main crop variety. It has the same resistance to late blight as Kewwick. Official application forms are available from the Superintendents of the Experimental Farms at Fredericton, Kentville and Charlottetown or from local potato certification inspectors. These completed forms together with remittance covering the cost of the seed ordered will be received from regular foundation or certified potato seed growers by the Superintendents of the three Experimental Farms named above on or before September 30, 1958. Should the demand exceed the supply, applications will be filled in the order received.

Vice-Pres. Of Blind Council, George Haines, Dies At 53

The death of George Haines, 53, occurred suddenly Sunday at 195 Hillsboro Street. Totally blind for the past nine years, the late Mr. Haines was a tireless worker in every project designed to brighten the lives of those burdened with a similar affliction. He was chief architect and first president of the Friendship Club of the Blind which was founded in Charlottetown in September 1954, and at the time of his death was vice-president of the Maritime Division of the Canada Council of the Blind.

Widely read and self-educated he gave unstintingly of his time and talent to many community and church projects. Born in Canso, N. S., the late Mr. Haines moved to Prince Edward Island in 1923 and made his home in French River, where he worked both as a farmer and a fisherman. Appointed manager of the CNIB's Charlottetown Hospital canteen, their first on P. E. I. he moved to Charlottetown in 1949. Several years later he was given charge of the canteen at Riverside Hospital, and had worked there continuously ever since until the day prior to his death. Survivors include his father, Leslie Haines, Charlottetown; three brothers, Austin, Percy, and William, all residing in Ontario; and one sister Lucy, Mrs. Rasmussen, whose home is in Denmark. His funeral will take place today from Trinity United Church with services commencing at 2:00 p. m. Interment will be in Geddie Memorial Church Cemetery.

Ch'town Man Purchases Old Patriot Site

A.H. Anderson, a Charlottetown business man, confirmed last night that he had purchased the site of the former Patriot Office building from the owners, the Independent Order of Oddfellows. Mr. Anderson did not disclose the purchase price which was rumored to be in the vicinity of \$9,000. He did not say what would be done with the property, although it was believed that a new office building would be erected. The Patriot office plant was destroyed by fire August 31, of last year.

Dr. Nimer Told Of 'Prowler' Before Death

NEW YORK (AP)—Dr. Melvin Nimer told of a masked prowler in his dying statement, Staten Island authorities disclosed Monday. Some of the vacancies left by the changes will be filled later, including that of ambassador to Washington, the External Affairs Department said. The main switch brings Norman Robertson, 54, back from the Washington post to the job of undersecretary of state for external affairs, one he filled from 1941 to 1946. Jules Leger, 45, leaves Ottawa or Paris as permanent representative to the North Atlantic Council and office of European Economic Co-operation. The Paris position is left vacant by the retirement of silver-haired L. Dana Wilgress, appointed there in 1953. Mr. Wilgress, 66, joined the Trade Department in 1914. He became deputy minister of the department in 1940 and minister to the Soviet Union in 1942, then ambassador in 1944. ONCE IN LONDON Subsequently the Vancouver-born diplomat was ambassador to Switzerland, high commissioner to the United Kingdom and undersecretary of state for external affairs. Another veteran who is resigning is Hugh L. Keenleyside, 60, director-general of the United Nations' Technical Administration since 1950. Mr. Keenleyside joined External Affairs in 1928 and became Mexican ambassador in 1944 and later deputy minister of mines and resources. Mr. Leger has been undersecretary of state since 1954 and previously ambassador to Mexico among other postings. Mr. Robertson went to Washington in 1957 from London where he was high commissioner for the second time. In between the 1946 and 1952 London appointments he had been clerk of the Privy Council and cabinet secretary. Vacancies at the Yugoslav, Belgian and Argentine embassies were left after the list of retirements and appointments. Thomas Stone goes to Mexico from the Netherlands, succeeding D.S. Cole, and is succeeded by Charles P. Hebert who is ambassador to Belgium. GOES TO BRITAIN George Ignatieff, Russian-born diplomat now ambassador to Yugoslavia, succeeds Sydney D. Pierce at London as deputy high commissioner with the latter's new posting to be named later. John Clark Watkins goes to Denmark as ambassador and Ar-

Diplomatic Shuffles And Retirements Announced

OLD SMITH OF LONDON to the United Arab Republic in the same capacity. Paul Beaulieu is ambassador of the newly-created post for the Lebanon. Both Middle East jobs were held by R.M. MacDonnell whose appointment as deputy undersecretary of state was announced previously. Stuart D. Densley, head of the department's inspection service, goes to Boston as consul-general. John Price Erichsen-Brown, charge d'affaires in Warsaw, becomes Canadian commissioner to the international supervisory commission for Vietnam, succeeding Lem Carter. Another ambassador change is that of L. Philippe Picard, former Liberal member of parliament whose appointment to the Argentine is expired and whose services are not being renewed.

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Hayden Decision Over Godih Given A Mixed Reception

NEW GLASGOW (CP)—Maritime lightweight champion Jackie Hayden of nearby Stellarton won an upset split decision over French lightweight champion Lahaoui Godih in a 10-round bout here Monday night. Judge Al Brown voted for Hayden 6-3-1, and judge Fred Wilson favored the Maritime champ 6-4. Judge Dan MacMillan saw it 3-5-2 in favor of Godih. The Frenchman, a heavy pre-fight favorite on the strength of a record of 51 wins against five losses and two draws, weighed in at 137½. Hayden scaled 135. MIXED RECEPTION The decision got a mixed reception from a slim crowd of 1,500. There were no knockdowns and Hayden bore the only mark of the fight, a cut high on the forehead. Godih and his manager Jersey Jones appeared shocked by the verdict. Later in the dressing room Jones said it was his "first and last trip to Nova Scotia." In a six-round semi-final Doug Odo, 153, of Thornburn, N.S., won by unanimous decision over Kenny Shea, 157, of Dartmouth, N.S. Bill Stewart, 179, Thornburn, scored a split decision over Peter Duff, 158, Stellarton, and Leo Steele, 123, Charlottetown, who George Burns, 120, Halifax, at the 29 second mark of the first round.

Elm Avenue Men Draw Stiff Fines

Two Elm Avenue men were rapped with \$150 and costs fines or 30 days in jail when they appeared before Magistrate K.M. Martin at Charlottetown Police Court Monday morning. One pleaded guilty to a driving while impaired charge. The other pleaded guilty to a driving while intoxicated charge. Four city residents were fined \$10 and costs or five days when they appeared on drunk and incapable charges. Nine others were remanded to Tuesday, September 23rd. An Albany man pleaded guilty to a speeding charge and was fined \$50 and costs or 20 days.

Sentenced For Racial Riots

LONDON (Reuters) — Judge Cyril Salmon Monday sentenced nine white youths who triggered London's racial disorders to four years in prison. "It was you men who started the whole of this violence," the judge said. The youths, between 17 and 20 years old, set out on a "nigger-hunting expedition" on Aug. 24 in the Notting Hill district of London. They armed themselves with iron bars, a car crank, table legs and a knife and toured the seedy Notting Hill district looking for West Indians to beat up. They attacked five men, severely injuring three of them.
