DIPHTHERIA.—Owing to the prevalence of diphtheria at Bonshaw and neighboring settlements, a board of health has been formed for Lots 30 and 65, with Dr. Alexander Murchison, of Clyde River, as Health Officer for the district. Dr. Johnson had a conference with Dr. Murchison on Saturday with reference to the action to be taken to prevent the further spread of the disease. There are said to be several cases of diphtheria in the district at present, and some deaths from the disease have occurred.

Three Halifax and Dartmouth doctors says the Halifax Herald have been called, but all three are of the opinion that the woman only imagines she is ill. The same person insisted that she should be placed in a Halifax institution for treatment. She remained in the hospital for some time. She was told by the physician in charge that she was not a sick woman, but she refused to accept the physician's views. She is now again at her home in Dartmouth. She will not get out of bed and her people are puzzled to know what to do with her.

A milk cow and bull, owned by Donald Christolm, of Briley Brook, were brought to Antigonish and weighed last Saturday. The cow weighed 1590 pounds, the bull 1510.

THE CANADIAN DIVORCE MILL.—An Ottawa despatch says: There are eight applications for divorce bills, but three or four of these are likely to be dropped. James A. M. ANOTHER FIRE.—The building in the rear of Miller Bros. Music Store, Queen Street, owned by Mrs. Offer and occupied by Miller Bros', as a stable and store-room, was damaged by fire on Saturday night. The alarm sounded about midnight. The firemen got to work with all possible despatch, and soon succeeded in extinguishing the fire. The two horses in the stable were rescued by some young men who were early on the scene. Building and contents were insured. The origin of the fire is unknown. While working at the fire Mr. W. Knight lost a valuable gold locket off his watch chain.

THE MONTHS WORK.—During the month of February, ending to-day, there were ten convictions for drunkenness, three for nuisance, and one each for assault, vagrancy, fast driving, larceny, selling liquor to Indians, and disturbing religious worship. Two persons charged with maintaining and keeping a brothel were dismissed, and there was also one dismissal for fast driving and one for drunkenness. The receipts of the court during the month amounted to \$79.01. During the month of February, 1891, there were eight convictions for drunkenness, and during February, 1890, there were twelve convictions for the same offence.

SUPREME COURT.—Pursuant to an order of Mr. Justice Hensley, made in the suit of Alexander Horne vs. Fenton T. Newbery, for the examination of the defendant before the Prothonotary this morning, the defendant was called but made default. The assignees were then called, but acting under the advice of their counsel, Mr. Morson, they refused to be sworn or produce any papers the property of the defendant (Newbery), on the ground that he had not yet been examined. Mr. W. S. Stewart was attorney for Mr. Horne, the plaintiff. The examination was adjourned till Wednesday, 30th March.

MISSIONARY CONCERT.—The Missionary Concert held last Friday week in East Royalty Schoolhouse, was repeated on Friday evening last in the Union Road church. Both concerts were well attended. The programme was made up of vocal and instrumental music, readings, recitations and dialogues. The singing was led by Miss Emma McCallum, and Miss Lizzie Wilson, of Charlottetown, presided at the organ. The large audience was well pleased with the manner in which the programme was carried out. At the first concert the choir presented Miss Lizzie Wilson with an address accompanied by a handsome dressing case, as a small token of their esteem for herself and in appreciation of her services as organist at the concert and the previous practice.
