

Royal Visit Is Big Topic On Parliament Hill

OTTAWA, July 10 — (CP) — Politics has gone out of the window so far as parliament hill is concerned. The big story now, and for weeks to come, is the October visit to Canada of Princess Elizabeth and the Duke of Edinburgh.

Their impending visit promises to overshadow even the fall session of parliament, now scheduled to open Oct. 9. The royal itinerary has not yet been drafted, but the princess and her husband are expected here before the parliamentary opening.

Renowned though the Royal Family traditionally and constitutionally is from the political realm, interest is being heightened in political circles by the possibility that the Princess may address a joint session of the Commons and the Senate.

While such an address, should the Princess make one, would be far removed from the field of politics, it would gain significance from the mere fact that it was delivered by the heiress to the throne.

She already has made speeches of public and constitutional significance.

The first was in an Empire Day talk in 1946, when she described the commonwealth as "A Model Brotherhood" owing its existence to "God's guidance and the work of our forefathers all over the world."

Then, on her 21st birthday, she dedicated her life to the globe-girdling empire. Visiting South Africa with the King and Queen in 1947, she told a world-wide radio audience from Capetown: "I declare before you all that my whole life, whether it be long or short, shall be devoted to your service and the service of our great imperial family to which we all belong."

Elizabeth's early schooling included constitutional and economic studies, including the problems of governing a commonwealth.

It has been suggested here, entirely unofficially, that the opening date of Parliament may be advanced a week to permit the Princess to speak before the Commons and the Senate. It would not be considered likely that she would make more than one visit to the capital during her expected three-week stay in Canada.

However, the Princess has asked that the arrangements for the trip be kept as simple and as informal as possible and she may rule out anything as elaborate as a parliamentary appearance.

Prime Minister St. Laurent, announcing the visit, said that her wish for informality would be respected.
