CAPE COLONY.

A Very Serious Situation.

Desperate Efforts of Boers to Prolong the War.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

LONDON, Dec. 10.—It is reported that the government of Cape Colony realizes that the condition of the country is far from satisfactory, although it refrains, for various reasons, from proclaiming martial law.

Probably the greatest source of anxiety is the interest prevailing in the districts immediately south of the Orange River Colony. Large numbers of Dutch colonists are there and they are excited by the near presence of DeWit's force which, after many days fighting with Knox, and after being turned North and apparently frustrated in its design to rule the colony has again escaped its pursuers and was last heard of moving south for Odendal Drift.

Troops are holding the drifts. But nothing short of impossibilities will stop DeWit, and there is anxiety lest he be next heard of in possession of some British town.

According to the Pretoria correspondent of the Standard the refugee burghers there are firmly convinced that Cape Colony is on the verge of rebellion.

They say there are still 20,000 Boers in the field and that a large proportion of them are sharing in a concerted movement southward.

One of the Botha's with General Viljoen is engaging the British forces at the north for the purpose of keeping as many troops as possible from being sent south while Cape Colony is being invaded.

It is regarded as a proof of the seriousness of the situation that Lord Kitchener has been at Bloemfontein for the last few days.

The Boers do not relinquish their conviction that a war between France and Great Britain is bound to come, and they are therefore making desperate efforts to prolong their resistance.

SUMMERSIDE NOTES.

News of Saturday—Reported for The Examiner.

Misses Janie and Carrie Mawley have taken the Gaffney House on Central Street, three blocks above the Clifton. Their new hotel has been enlarged and heated with hot water, bath rooms, electric light and all modern improvements. The dwelling has been painted and renovated and newly furnished throughout. These young ladies are famed for their skill in catering to the appetites and comfort of the traveling public and no doubt they will be liberally patronized. The new Mawley House is a valuable acquisition to the hotel accommodation of the town.

The harbor remains open and the good ship Northumberland continues to make her trips with the accustomed regularity. She has only missed one so far. Captain Cameron is a great man with the Summerside people. They have only one complaint against him—he won't come here to live. Mr James A Morrison has just finished loading the schooner "Carlamio" with 5000 bushels of potatoes and a deck load of hay for Boston.

The smelt season is on, and the small boys' harvest has commenced with the hook and line. Mr J A Morrison is the principal buyer. He makes daily shipments some hundreds of boxes weekly. Shippers are anxiously looking for the arrival of the Stanley. Shipping via Georgetown causes delay and often loss on perishable goods.

Sleighting was good on Saturday and the day being fine the town was full of country people. Large quantities of pork and poultry were bought in. The merchants had a good day.

S. H. Jones, vice-president of the East Richelieu Valley railway, now under Rutland management and known as the Quebec Central, and mayor of Sabrevois, is in the city, and in an interview at the Windsor hotel today he told a Herald representative that for the last two weeks he has been in Prince Edward Island buying all the live produce he could see for the Boston market. Mr Jones is the Canadian representative of an important New England commercial institution which does a large business in farm products with the eastern townships, and he was deputed to exploit the island. While there he bought and shipped to Boston 12,000 lambs, 7,000 live geese, besides large quantities of turkeys and fowl.
