

Requirements Of U. S. Visa Are Revised

Landed immigrants in Canada Passport requirements have been changed effective August 1 for landed immigrants in Canada who apply for visas to visit the United States. When a landed immigrant applies for a visa at the United States Consulate General in Halifax, he must present a passport valid in most instances for six months beyond his intended stay in the United States. If the landed immigrant is stateless, he must present a certificate of identity issued by the Department of External Affairs, Ottawa. United States Immigration authorities will continue to honor expired passports bearing valid visas until October 1.

Mayors Welcome Proposed Per Capita Grant Increase

The proposal of the Provincial Government to increase the per capita grant to municipalities from \$8 to \$9 advanced Friday by Premier A.W. Matheson to the P.E.I. Federation of Mayors and Municipalities, was met with approval and enthusiasm by municipal mayors throughout the province.

Under the new scheme, instead of \$80,000 being advanced to municipalities as in the past, they will receive approximately \$100,000, in effect, tripling the amount paid out each year up to the present.

With a population of about 18,000, Charlottetown will benefit by \$108,000, while other municipalities such as Summerside, Alberton, Borden, Kensington, Montague, Souris and Georgetown will benefit also in proportion to their population.

had to pay ever increasing taxes." Mayor Bruce H. Yeo of Montague, past president of the P.E.I. Federation, also expressed his pleasure at the new arrangement, and stated that the additional monies would assist considerably in affecting civic administration in the Town of Montague.

The statement of Premier Matheson made it clear that any grants common to all municipalities such as Welfare, fire fighting, etc., will remain the same. Only concessions not common to all will come under review.

W. I. Sponsors Canoe Cove Blood D. Clinic

In preparation for the Red Cross Blood Donor Clinic to be held at Canoe Cove Hall on Tuesday August 26th, an organizational meeting was held in Canoe Cove. In attendance were representatives of seven of the twelve Women's Institutes in the area who will be sponsoring the Clinic under the overall Chairmanship of Mrs. John MacCannell, R.N., of Canoe Cove.

Mr. Walter R. Shaw, president of the P.E.I. Division, Canadian Red Cross Society, presided at this meeting which was addressed by Mr. F.A.S. Jones, Provincial Chairman of the Red Cross Committee, who outlined the importance of the Red Cross Blood Transfusion Service and the necessity of its support by every citizen. The film, "Prescription for Life," which vividly portrays the blood transfusion service in action, was shown and greatly impressed all those in attendance.

Canvassers from the various districts present at the meeting decided to make use of the "Life Saver Club" application cards in soliciting prospective donors for the Canoe Cove Clinic. The Canoe Cove Clinic will be the fourth of its kind to be held in this area but the first to take place with Canoe Cove as the Centre, and the Women's Institutes involved are determined to do all in their power to win the "Manning Trophy" which is up for competition.

Urge Potato Spraying Be Continued Now

Owing to the possibility of the development of late blight, potato growers of Prince Edward Island and Nova Scotia are advised not to relax their precautions regarding the late blight spray schedule. Conditions, it is pointed out, are favorable to the development and spread of the disease, and some centres are considered infected to a sufficient degree to become the focal point of a serious outbreak should weather conditions get humid or showery.

A regular programme of spraying is insurance against such a future development.

Potato aphid populations have been building up in almost all potato fields during the past week. The second brood of flea beetles should begin to appear this week. Spray or dust with malathion to control aphids, and DDT to control flea beetles. (Malathion will control flea beetles but it would have to be applied at weekly intervals.)
