AN INTERESTING CASE.

From Prince Edward Island the Sun bears of an interesting case of partisan investigation. The accused in this instance was the keeper of a railway station in a small village in Queen's county. The station keeper was admittedly a competent man and the only excuse that seekers for the office could make for dismissal was a charge of partisanship. The charge was accordingly made. Commissioner Palmer, himself a vigorous partisan, holds the inquiries in Prince Edward Island, in consideration of a handsome sum per day. Of course he was ready for action. The witnesses called to support the charges had no evidence to give, and so Commissioner Palmer started in on a fishing expedition. The people of the village were summoned, one after another, and questioned on the subject of the station master's partisanship. In this way the whole town was summoned, each witness of course receiving the usual fee. When all the residents of the place and some of the neighbors within a considerable distance had been brought before the commissioner the charge had to be dismissed. No evidence in support of the prosecution could be got after the outlay of time and money. The consequence is that the station master is still in his place, while the treasury of Canada is paying the bills.

This is a match for the Quebec case in which Mr. M. Lock's commissioner put in a bill for \$25 a day for several days expended in starting an inquiry into a ten dollar postmaster's office. Certain political considerations required that the accused postmaster should be retained in his place, and the Quebec commissioner was ordered to abandon the inquiry when he had only got it well under way. In both cases the officer stays and the country pays. —St. John Sun.

HOME NEWS FROM ABROAD.

A SPECIAL to the St. John Telegraph (Liberal) says:—

CHARLOTTETOWN, Oct. 12.—It is understood here that Premier Peters will resign and remove to British Columbia to practice his profession. He will likely be succeeded in the leadership of the Liberal party in the local house by A. B. Warburton, one of Mr. Peters' first lieutenant and a leading lawyer here. Mr. Warburton has been a member of the House of Assembly for some years. The names of Hous. D. Farquharson and Peter Sinclair, both members of the Peters administration, are also mentioned. Mr. Peters, when asked regarding the rumor, said he had nothing to say for publication.

Premier Peters could easily have said so, if the rumors about him are untrue. He has not done so, however, and they stand uncontradicted.

THE NEWS IN SHORT METRE.

Items of Interest Brought Down For More Easy Reading.

Potatoes are quoted at \$1.75 to \$1.90 per bush in Houlton, Me.

Premier Laurier has arranged with a London publishing house to write a history of the Hudson Bay.

It appears to be the intention of France to force Siam into vassalage unless Great Britain intervenes.

The King's Daughters, having held a successful convention in Ottawa, adjourned to meet next year at St. John, N. B.

A number of Jewish artisans in Jerusalem have petitioned the Queen of Great Britain to establish them in Cyprus.

The conductors on the Broadway cable care in New York will hereafter be allowed to wear a mustache, but whiskers are barred.

Baroness Macdonald, of Earncliffe, has written an article on the career of the late Sir John A. Macdonald for the November Pall Mall Gazette.

Shediac merchants are paying one dollar per barrel for potatoes, and are receiving very large quantities. R. C. Taite has taken as much as 2,000 barrels per day.

Herbert Cutting, a Toronto sneak thief, who robbed some sixty boarding houses, has been sentenced to 364 days in the Central Prison.

During an ascent of Mount Ararat, Armenia, by members of the recent geological congress, Dr. Stoerber, a professor of medicine, was frozen to death.

In Montreal yesterday Judge Wurtel sentenced Grenier to six months' imprisonment and bound him to keep the peace for two years for libelling Tarte.

The Turkish Sultan has presented the German Kaiser some of the cannon captured from the Greeks, and the latter has written Abdul Hamid a letter of thanks.

It is reported at Constantinople that a serious Arab rising has occurred at Bussorah, in Asiatic Turkey. Troops have been sent to the scene from Erzinghan.

Heavy shipments of wheat from the Pacific coast to Europe continue. Over sixty grain laden vessels have left San Francisco during the last two months and six more are ready to sail.

Several German papers assert, that under present conditions the Government will ask increased power to tax for revenue purposes, the amount spoken of being 50,000,000 marks.

By wiping perspiration from his face with the back of his hand while counting coin, F. J. Eighmey, of Waterloo, Ia., poisoned his eyes badly, apparently with dust from the foreign accretions on the metal.

A military officer at Halifax states that the authorities have in view the placing of two British regiments in British Columbia, and that a consignment of troops will be sent out there within a month.

A special despatch from Madrid says that the Queen Regent has ordered that assistance be given to the families of the anarchists executed at Barcelona some time ago, and that their children be educated at her expense.

Archibald Blue, director of the Bureau of Mines, of Ontario, writes to his department from Michipicoten that a vein of extraordinary richness has been struck near Wawa Lake, assaying as much as \$900 to the ton, and which bids fair to keep up this showing.

Madrid reports say that the Spanish Government is so hard pressed for money that it is attempting to sell all the public lands and buildings that can be possibly spared. Not only is the pay of the soldiers unpaid since last March, but the pension list are in arrears.

A Rome despatch states that the Ministry of the Interior has published instructions to the various prefects, to repress clerical demonstrations against the institutions of the country, and to prevent the holding of political meetings in churches.

The Prince of Wales has declined an invitation to mediate in the engineering dispute. In the course of his letter of refusal he says that he deeply deplors the "disastrous state of affairs," but feels it would not be right or proper for him to interfere in any way or to mix himself therein.

The London Morning Post, accuses the American jingos of "trying to force a quarrel with England or Spain for the purpose of diverting the attention of the country from home troubles Bryanism, and the general revolt against the domination of the professional politicians." It expresses the hope that Spain, like Lord Salisbury, will maintain coolness and good temper in the face of President McKinley's provocative attitude.

Bishop McKin, the Episcopal Prelate of Tokio is in San Francisco. He says that a total of 150,000 converts in Japan, the Roman Catholic are first with about 50,000 and the Greek Catholics second with 23,000. The Episcopalians number 10,000. He says that in the matter of church government, spiritually and theologically the Episcopal and Greek Catholic Churches in Japan are closer than any other religious bodies, and intimates that the two bodies may soon be united.

RAILWAY CHANGES.—To-day Mr. H. W. Anderson, who for many years was Mechanical Foreman on the P. E. I. Railway, yields up his position as a sacrifice to the god of vengeance. Mr. Anderson's crime is that of being a Liberal Conservative, and for this he suffers under the political guillotine. It is satisfactory to hear however, in connection with Mr. Anderson's dismissal, that the government has not gone outside of the railway employ to pitchfork one of their followers into the vacant place. The position of Locomotive Foreman will be filled by Mr. W. S. Poole, who has been for upwards of twenty years in the service. He is a man of wide experience, and helped to put up the first locomotive that came for the Island Railway, and will, we believe, competently discharge the duties of his new position. Also, in consequence of Mr. Anderson's dismissal, is the official promotion of Mr. Henry Coffin to the position of Car Foreman.

FUNERAL OF MR. HIRAM T. LEA.—The funeral of Hiram Thompson Lea took place from his late residence yesterday afternoon at 2 o'clock. The service at the house was conducted by Rev. W. W. Lodge, assisted by Rev. S. T. Teed and Rev. John Prince. The floral tributes were numerous, showing the esteem in which the deceased was held. The casket being completely covered. Among others were a wreath of chrysanthemums from the choir of the Central Methodist Church; crescent from the Mission Band of the E. C. C. E.; crown, Mrs. Deraier and Mrs. Norfolk; star, Grade X of the public school; wreath, Mrs. Thomas Williams; anchor Miss Gertie Walker; Anchor, Mr. Fred Kinnear; crescent Mr. John Ross; and several bouquets.
