CAPE BRETON RAILWAY.—It is now stated that regular traffic will commence on the Cape Breton Railway as an extension of the Intercolonial on the 17th of November, when the winter timetable of the Intercolonial goes into effect. The superintendent of the Intercolonial, Mr. D. Pottinger, is expected to be in Ottawa shortly to confer with the department about the new road.

OXFORD AND NEW GLASGOW RAILWAY.—The work of grading on the Oxford and New Glasgow railway was completed last week, and all other work is expected to be brought to a close within the next few weeks. The accommodation train, which has been running over the road for some time, has had all the business it could handle, and a large traffic is assured.

NEWFOUNDLAND NEWS.—The steamer Hurlaw arrived at Halifax on Sunday morning from the west coast of Newfoundland, via Cape Breton ports, having been as far north as Flower's Cove, which port she left on the 28th ult. Captain Farquhar reports the people at Flower's Cove and vicinity in very much better circumstances this season than they were last, although little or no herring was taken, but the catch of cod was fairly good.

POLICE COURT.—This morning some boys appeared charged with breaking windows in the Hillborough Rink. The guilt of two of the boys was proven, but as this was the first case of the kind brought before His Honor, and the prosecutor did not wish to be too severe, the boys were admonished and discharged. His Honor said in the next case of the kind that came before him he would not be so lenient, but would certainly send the offenders to jail. One drunk was fined \$2 or 8 days, and a Scott Act case was adjourned.

Developing Trade with Britain.

OTTAWA, Nov. 4. The Minister of Finance has, since the passage of the McKinley bill, been carefully following up the question of exports of eggs and poultry to the British market, by correspondence with steamship lines, with reference to dunnage, etc., utilization of crates, etc., and conditions of sea carriage. Mr. Sanders is to report about the first of December next, and the report will be at once published for the information of shippers for the December trade. To transport inquiries as to prices in Britain, the methods of shipment, etc., and by correspondence with shippers. As a result he has established the fact that good facilities are provided for the transport of eggs without artificial cold storage. To full enquiry into the possibilities of the poultry trade, he has sent to Britain a practical shipper, Mr. Saunders, of Kempville, to inquire into the conditions on which trade in these articles can be carried on between Canada and Britain, especially the best markets for distribution, the best seasons for shipment, the class of articles best suited to the market, the condition in which they should be placed upon the market and the modes of packing.

Opening of the Quebec Legislature

QUEBEC, Nov. 4. The first session of the seventh Parliament of Quebec was opened to-day by Governor Angers. Hon. Felix Marchand was elected Speaker. The speech from the throne forebodes measures for the improvement of the system of primary education, for the better remuneration of teachers, the extension of the free night-school system, and the opening up of undeveloped territory by means of new railroads and competing of roads already commenced. The construction of needed public buildings, the advancement of the Quebec bridge scheme, the abolition of toll gates, the opening of roads, the construction of iron bridges, the establishment of central agricultural schools and the amelioration of our lunatic asylum system.

Another Improbable Story.

OTTAWA, Nov. 4. The department of Justice received to-day a letter purporting to be from a girl named Mabel Morton, who confesses to having shot B-nwell. She dates the letter from North Adams and states that B-nwell having betrayed her in England, she followed him in disguise to Niagara and arranged with Birchall for \$25 to decoy him to a swamp in order to enable her to frighten him to marry her. Birchall did so and left them together. B-nwell refused to marry her and she produced a revolver and as he turned to run she shot him. Her story seems quite incredible.

A Call Not Sustained.

HALIFAX, Nov. 4. The Presbytery of Halifax, at its meeting to-day, refused to sustain the call from St. Matthew's Church of this city to Rev. A. J. Mowatt, of Fredericton. The ground for the refusal was that the call was not harmonious. The ballot was taken at the congregational meeting, and when the call was decided upon the vote stood 25 to 19 in favor of Mr. Mowatt.

Will Transfer Their Investments.

MONTREAL, Nov. 4. It is understood here that quite a number of the English members of the Iron and Steel Institute go home fully determined to transfer their investments from the United States to Canada.

Gladsstone has declined to stand for the re-election of the University of Aberdeen. He gives his advanced age as a reason for declining the nomination. The present incumbent of the office is the Right Hon. G. J. Goschen, Chancellor of the Exchequer.

Austrian official papers ignore the visit of the Austrian Empress to Rome. She remained there two days, staying at a hotel under the name of Mrs. Norris, and accompanied by a single attendant. She had a long audience with the Pope.

Prince Bismarck has made arrangements to start a brewery at Friedrichsruhe. Several Hamburg capitalists are interested in the concern, which will have a capital of 50,000 marks. The financiers will run the brewery for fifty years, paying rent to Bismarck. The ex-chancellor reserves for his heirs the right to buy the concern after 50 years. It is expected that the house will do a large export trade.

Berlin drank in 1889, 239,247,160 quarts of beer—that is, about 150 quarts to every man, woman, and child.

The Italian states that the American Consul-General at Rome has sent a memorandum to the Chamber of Commerce, which is intended to correct erroneous comments made by the European press on the effect of the McKinley law. The consul-general declares the new law is favorable to Italian interests and will lead to a marked increase in Italy's trade with the United States.
