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What Would Canada Do For Leaders If Maritimers Moved?

OTTAWA (CP) — Nova Scotia George Nowlan doesn't think much of the Gordon economic commission's suggestion that citizens of the Atlantic provinces move to other parts of Canada if they want to better themselves financially.

"That would have a disastrous effect upon the rest of Canada," he said Friday in the Commons. "Where would Canada get its leaders?"

"If they're going to take us all out of the Maritimes," added the Progressive Conservative member for Digby - Annapolis - Kings, "there's going to be no foundation stock left."

He referred, during three speech debate, to the commission's further suggestion, made in its preliminary report, issued Thursday, that assistance be provided to Atlantic residents who decide to move to other parts of the country.

"In other words we're going to get our travelling expenses paid. They're going to have to do better than that."

The commission said it is in every Canadian's interest to reduce the differential between living standards in the Atlantic provinces and those in other parts of Canada.

That was fine Mr. Nowlan said, except for the commission's qualifying phrase: "If at all possible to do so."

That, he suggested, was certainly a gloomy view to take of Atlantic provinces' problems. Citizens of those provinces would certainly be glad that the report was issued after, rather than before, Christmas; it would have been a discouraging thing to have happened before the holiday season.

Official Quarters In Britain Approve Eisenhower Doctrine

By PAMELA MATTHEWS LONDON (Reuters) — The formulation by the president of the United States of an "Eisenhower Doctrine" for the Middle East, implying a declaration of positive interest backed if necessary by force to preserve the territorial integrity of the area, meets with warm approval in official quarters here.

Through Britain was not consulted in advance about President Eisenhower's decision to seek Congressional authority for the dispatch of United States troops to the area if necessary, the move is regarded here as a big contribution to Middle East stability.

There is also approval for the year-end call by State Secretary Dulles to the people of the United States to assume greater responsibility for the Middle East.

British policy toward the Middle East has for the last two years been based on the belief that Soviet infiltration into the area would swing the world balance of power against the anti-Communist world.

This belief lay at the root of Britain's backing for and membership in the five-nation Baghdad Defence pact of Britain, Turkey, Iran, Iraq and Pakistan.

There has been a pronounced wish here in the last 18 months that the United States should assume responsibilities capable of filling the power gap.

The fact that President Eisenhower is only now about to act on the evidence of Soviet penetration is attributed to the influence on United States policy of the approaching presidential election last year.

It is not official British policy to press for actual United States membership in the Baghdad Pact. But some informed quarters here

U. S. Automotive Output Report

DETROIT (AP)—Ward's Automotive Reports said Friday 146,527 passenger cars are scheduled for completion in the United States this week.

This compares with 91,130 units last week, which was holiday shortened. In the same 1956 week 150,030 cars were made.

Canadian passenger car production this week was estimated to be 9,820 and trucks, 1,287. The figures were 5,607 and 957 last week. In the same week a year ago Canadian production was 6,009 and 1,026.

Indictment On Grounds Of Criminal Negligence

Edward Matthews, Charlottetown, pleaded not guilty to two counts of a charge of criminal negligence after being arraigned before Justice Mark R. MacGuigan as the January sitting of the Supreme Court yesterday.

Earlier in the day the Grand Jury after one hour and a half's deliberation produced a true bill of indictment against Matthews in connection with charges arising from the death of Joseph Frederick Steele. The first count of the charge was that of criminal negligence resulting in death and the second that of criminal negligence causing bodily harm.

Justice MacGuigan, in his address to the grand jury after they had been duly sworn, stated that the criminal negligence listed in the charge did not concern the accident in which the accused was involved. Rather he said, it concerned the actions of the accused immediately subsequent to the mishap in regard to what was done with the victim.

In their deliberation, the jurors found it necessary to call seven witnesses, all of whom testified at preliminary hearings into the case. The trial will come before the petit jury, starting Monday of next week. J. P. Nicholson is representing the Crown and J. A. MacDonald Q. C., the accused.

The court convened, over an hour late at 12:05 p.m., with eight men called for jury duty appearing. After considering the validity of the Matthews' indictment, which was the only one presented to them, the jurors left on a tour of inspection to the public buildings. Due to road and weather conditions their tour was limited to a call at the Queen's County Jail.

The Grand Jury for the sessions is composed of Leonard MacDonald, Charlottetown, foreman; Dan Cummings, Vernon; Arthur Robertson, East Royalty; George Newman, Parkdale; Rankin McLaune, Charlottetown; Howard Hobbs, Charlottetown; Lawson Hood, Hazelbrook; Wilfred Burke, Charlottetown; and James Doyle, Mount Stewart.

Island Yorkshires Make New High Records, Aid N.B. & N.S.

On a volume of 70,000 hogs shipped through inspected packing in his reports Livestock Fieldman H. W. Clay, P. E. Island has set a new high record of 57.9 per cent Grade A hogs. This is an increase from 54.1 per cent in 1955 and 39.8 per cent in 1943.

The following table gives the comparative rate of improvement by provinces:

This statement shows a steady annual gain in quality in all three Maritime Provinces while the rest of Canada shows very small improvement or none at all.

The improvement in N. S. and N. B. can be credited in a great measure to the use, in recent years, of breeding stock originating in P. E. I. Such districts as Woodstock, N. B., and the Annapolis Valley, N. S., have been using

Island bred boars in increasing numbers since 1950.

In the face of this Maritime level of quality, it is surprising to find that between 20 and 25 per cent of all hogs marketed dress either over 170 lbs. or under 140 lbs. P. E. Island alone this carelessness results in an annual loss of over one hundred thousand dollars to the producers.

The following statement emphasizes the mistake hog producers make when shipping off-weight hogs:

From these values it is evident that when a hog yields over 170 lbs., the extra weight results in less money and no returns for the extra feed. When we compare the 169 lb. Grade A carcass with the 202 lb. extra heavy, we find that the producer put an extra 33 lbs. on for nothing and lost \$2.20 for his trouble.

It may be difficult for Island hog producers to beat this 1956 record for quality alone, but Island hogs can show up to 75 per cent Grade A if our producers would weigh their hogs before shipment. In this way, many owners would save the equivalent of the highest day's pay they ever received.

Recently, one producer shipped nine hogs, all light. He lost over one hundred dollars. If he had put 25 lbs. more on each hog he would have received about 60 cents per lb. for this gain. No hog producer can afford to ship light hogs before they reach their full market value. Neither can he afford the

You can't keep a good man down, they say, nor for that matter an over-affectionate dog.

Up he jumps, paw marks on your lapels, you ruffle up his fur with a friendly pat, brush yourself off and everybody is happy.

But wait a minute. How about that dirt you brushed off, incidentally brushing some of it into the coat as well as off it.

Unbelievable as it seems, particles of dirt and grime work like little buzz saws, their round and ragged edges, actually cutting into the fabric and weakening the threads.

That's just one way that putting off a cleaning job multiplies the problem. It's so easy to save up soiled clothes, thinking you'll "wait 'till we have a bundle to go to the cleaners."

It's so easy, and it's so hard on your clothes. Stains are a little like wine, they age with time. The wine gets stronger and the stains get tougher.

Then too, a hot iron will probably find its way on to an old stain, bringing both the cloth and that old stain back to life. Ironing hastens the "setting" process of stains and once a stain has been ironed it's practically impossible to get out.
