First R.A.F. Navigators Graduate At S'side Wings Parade Yesterday

Twenty-three British airmen yesterday became the first Royal Air Force navigators to receive their wings under the North Atlantic Treaty Organization training scheme.

The wings parade, which also saw the graduation of 21 Canadian airmen, was the third occasion upon which European airmen were graduated from the R.C.A.F. Navigational School here.

Previously, Italian, Belgian, Norwegian and French students received their training here. They have gone back to their homelands to become instructors in their air forces. Another R.A.F. group will receive its wings soon.

Air Commodore A. P. Revington, senior officer of the United Kingdom air liaison staff in Canada, presented the commissions. He was the first officer from another country to present wings to Canadian airmen in the history of the R.C.A.F.

Group Captain A.G. Kenyon of Ottawa, the base's youthful commanding officer, high-ranking officers and instructors also attending the impressive ceremony in the spacious recreation hall.

Air Commodore Revington said "It is an honor to witness the first Royal Air Force navigators to be trained in Canada since the Second World War."

Then, under the Commonwealth training scheme, 14,000 R.A.F. navigators were trained in this country.

"Another thing I want to tell you," he said "is that you men, as navigators, can take your place in the service as well as any other officer. It is no longer a pilot's air force."

Praises Co-operation
Air Commodore Revington said he had learned that the Canadian and British airmen on the station

had developed a close friendship. "It's great to know that you chaps mix so well. Someday, possibly over enemy territory, that close co-operation and friendliness is going to pay off."

Michael Atkins, a 19-year-old lad from Broadstairs, Kent, Eng., was the honor student in the British group. He passed with the highest mark after nine months of training.

Atkins, who spent his childhood in East Africa, was drafted when he became 18. He decided to spend his two years service with the R.A.F.

He will go back to England with his class next week for additional navigational courses.

George E. Conway Brown of New Westminster, B.C. led the Canadian class.

Chief Justice Campbell Speaks At Halifax

HALIFAX, Nov. 30-(CP)—Hon. Thane Campbell, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Prince Edward Island, tonight called for renewed efforts to preserve Scottish culture.

Chief Justice Campbell, addressing the North British Society of Halifax during the annual festival of St. Andrew's said many Scottish traditions and features were being lost with each generation.

He urged that the "roaring game" of curling be cultivated. "There is," he said, "probably no stronger link between Scotland and Canada than curling."

Is Critical Of MacQuarrie Report

OTTAWA, Nov. 30-(CP)—A prominent Canadian retail merchant today described the method by which the MacQuarrie Report on resale price maintenance was prepared as "disgraceful" and "scandalous."

R. A. Harris of Windsor, Ont., vice-president of the Canadian Retail Federation, said the report urging the Government to make price maintenance illegal has no factual evidence to back it up.

Recalled as a witness before Parliament's special committee on retail price-fixing, Mr. Harris produced percentage figures on margins of profit on clothing items and said the margins on price-maintained items are lower than on those which are not.

Alleging that the MacQuarrie Report had shown "no facts and figures," he maintained that such an important step as banning price maintenance—which would affect a large part of the economy—should not be considered until all these facts and figures are obtained.

Results Of O'Leary Census Announced

The census of the recently incorporated village of O'Leary has been completed, it was announced yesterday by Hon. Eugene Cullen, Minister of Industry and Natural Resources. It was also stated that the first public meeting of the Commissioners will be held on Tuesday, December 4.

Figures released by the Minister showed a total population within the incorporated area of 518 persons. Of these 301 are adults and 217 children. There are 136 families.

The Commissioners are Messrs. Alton Raynor, Bernard Shea and Ralph Adams. This is the third community to be incorporated under the Village Services Act.

Meetings To Promote Co-Operative Education

Summerside Co-Operative and all other co-operatives on Prince Edward Island, are combining in a new approach to co-operative education when the directors, education committee, managers, and complete staff of several neighboring Co-ops meet together for a two hour period once a week for six weeks.

The series has been organized by Mr. J. J. McIsaac, Fieldman for the Co-Operative Union on Prince Edward Island.

The subject discussed at the first meeting two weeks ago was "Economics of Co-operation." The discussion leader was Mr. Leo P. McIsaac, who in July returned from a study tour in Europe, and who has recently been appointed rural research director for the Co-operatives, Credit Unions, farm organizations, and other rural agencies in the Province.

The second week was led by Mr. C. M. MacLean, and dealt with merchandising, displays and store management. For this a practical demonstration was set showing the DO'S and DON'TS of merchandising and displays, and was explained by Mr. McLean who is General Manager of the Co-Operative Super Market in Charlottetown, and who has had a wide experience in this line of work.

The third week which is now in progress is being led by Rev. W. Simpson, who is the director of the Extension Department of St. Dunstan's College. His subject is a discussion of economic philosophies, Socialism, Communism, freedom, and democracy.

Further Meetings
Next week the speaker will be Jerome O'Brien who is manager of Island Co-Operative Services, and a member of the Prince Edward Island Potato Marketing Board. He will speak on marketing and processing; problems, possibilities and policies.

The fifth week will be taken by Mr. J. G. Dennis, Managing Director of the Co-operative Union of P. E. I., and the Credit Union League, Ltd. Mr. Dennis will deal with legal, accounting, inventory, and general business problems in co-operatives.

The sixth and final week will be by Mr. J. J. McIsaac, and others. It will deal with the question: "Where Do We Go From Here?" and will give considerable time to an open discussion on this and other subjects of interest to those in attendance.

These meetings in Summerside are held on Thursday evenings in Assumption Hall, where the Summerside Co-operative plays host to officials from Abegweit, (St. Carleton Siding), Kensington, Wellington, and Ellerslie Co-operatives.

In Western Prince County, a similar weekly session is being held on Friday evenings between the Co-operatives at O'Leary, Bloomfield, St. Louis, Alberton and Tignish.

On Monday evenings officials from Vernon River, Cherry Valley, Central Farmers (in Charlottetown), and North Rust Co-Operative Stores will meet in Charlottetown.
