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Alberton To Tignish Road Being Paved

The first heavy pavement in West Prince County in over twenty years is presently being laid on No. One highway between Alberton and Tignish. The contract for the rebuilding of this highway is held by the Hayes Paving Company Limited. Work was started Monday about three miles south of Tignish and is proceeding toward Alberton. Asphalt for the job is being trucked from Alma where the work of setting up the plant was completed last week. Also scheduled to be paved this summer are a number of streets in O'Leary and Alberton and several side roads leading from built up areas to the main highway.

Is Broke, Goes To Jail 15 Days

Before Magistrate R.S. Hinton at Summerside Police Court yesterday morning, a resident of Rocky Point, convicted of being intoxicated in a public place, and unable to pay the fine of \$25, was sentenced to spend 15 days in jail. A Summerside resident charged with possession of liquor not purchased at a vendor, was found guilty and fined \$40 and costs. Pleading guilty to being intoxicated in a public place, a Summerside man was fined \$20 and costs or 15 days; he elected to serve the 15 days. Charged with the same offense, a Richmond resident was fined a similar amount. A party from Charlottetown was also fined \$20 and costs for possession of liquor in a place other than his residence. Two Borden men were each fined \$5 and costs and given a severe warning for their part in the fracas which occurred at Border Pier on July 19 where damage was done to equipment belonging to a construction company.

WINTER EMPLOYMENT AID

Work To Begin Soon On 100 S'side Housing Units

Construction of 100 low cost rental housing units in Summerside is expected to commence immediately following a special meeting of the Summerside Town Council yesterday which agreed unanimously to provide essential municipal services to the new project which will be located in the north end of town between Central and Granville Streets. The housing project will be constructed by a new company which will be known as Hillcrest Housing Limited. The August 2nd issue of the Royal Gazette carried a notice of application for incorporation of this company, listing the applicants as Keith Pickard, Frances Veale, W. Chester MacDonald, T. Earle Hickey, and Cyril Hickey. The authorized capital of the company according to the application would be \$30,000. Municipal services which the town yesterday agreed to supply to the new project will include electricity, water and sewerage, streets, sidewalks, school facilities, fire and police protection. A letter from the company to the Town Council stated that each of the new homes would be equipped with electric stoves, refrigerators, and oil furnaces. It expressed the hope of commencing the project within five or six weeks and pointed out that this would insure winter employment for a number of men in the area. Mr. G. Keith Pickard, Summerside architect, and one of the applicants for incorporation of Hillcrest Housing Limited, said that the new housing development would be known as Hillcrest Park, and would be located on land purchased from Mr. S. S. Beaton. With the opening of the new streets he said the company would commence the construction of what he described as semi-detached and terraced homes. He said the company are in hopes of being able to obtain a loan through the National Housing Act under the limited dividend plan. This development he said, is being proposed primarily due to the acute shortage of housing accommodation in this area. The houses will consist of three and four bedroom units with full basement and all modern conveniences. They will be constructed under National Housing Act requirements. It is proposed to call tenders for building materials through local firms, and local labor will be used exclusively. This area is well suited to housing development, being within walking distances from schools, hospital, playground, Queen Elizabeth Park, etc. Mr. Pickard's announcement pointed out this proposed housing development will aid in reaching the required number of householders needed to obtain street mail delivery, and commencement of construction as planned would give winter employment. He said it is proposed to finance this project partially by a loan from Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation and by issuing shares, both common and preferred in the company. They public, he said, would have the opportunity to subscribe for shares in the company at a later date. With Mayor W. A. Currie presiding at yesterday's special meeting of Summerside Town Council, all councillors were present, and each one voiced his individual support for providing the municipal services of electricity, water and sewerage, storm sewers, streets, sidewalks, school facilities, fire and police protection to the proposed Hillcrest Park housing development. The councillors noted their desire of promoting progress within the town through the medium of increased building and increased population. Initial expenditures on water and sewerage and streets was estimated at \$73,000 with carrying charges of about \$8,000, and taxation revenue of \$20,600 annually.

113 Classes To Be Provided In Provincial Flower Show

Summerside will stage the 7th annual Provincial Flower Show on August 26th and 27th in the Baptist Church Hall, under the auspices of the Abegweit Chapter of the I.O.D.E., it was learned yesterday. This year there will be 113 classes open to exhibitors, including the added attraction of a category for baskets which are to be made up in the colours of the P. E. I. Floral Emblem; the "Lady Slipper", in shades of pink, white and green. The committee requests that this particular exhibit be placed in white baskets only, for the sake of uniformity in the background. Included in the various categories will be: Section A, Gladioli; B, Damias C, Various; D, Decorations; E, Potted Plants; F, Children's Corner; G, Roses. The popular novice section will again attract the new grower. Flowers can be entered by exhibitors on the night before the show (Monday evening) from 8 to 10 p.m., as well as on Tuesday morning. The exhibition will be open from 2.30 until 11 p.m. on the 26th, and from 2.30 until 6 p.m. on the 27th, with sale of flowers to the public commencing at 6 p.m. on the final day. At 3 p.m. on the 26th, Mayor W. A. Currie will welcome the general public and introduce the Hon. Alec Matheson, premier, who will officially open the show. On the evening of the 26th, there will be an excellent variety programme and presentation of the prizes. Tea will be served by the ladies of the I. O. D. E. on both Tuesday and Wednesday afternoon.

Decline In Unemployment Reported From Summerside

A decrease of about 40 per cent in the number of persons drawing unemployment was reported yesterday by Mr. Earle Cannon, Manager of the Unemployment Insurance Commission at Summerside. At mid-July there was a total of 962 persons drawing unemployment, 747 men and 215 women. As at August 14 this figure had dropped to 601, of which 441 were men and 160 women. Continued improvement is expected in the situation during the next few months until the normal off-season decline will begin. Considered partly responsible for the upswing in employment is the considerable amount of building going on at Summerside and contracts at the RCAF Station. Also at the present time the lobster fishing season is in full swing on the south shore, while the normal fishing season continues in other parts. The farm labour situation remains static at the present time but an upsurge is expected in the fall when the harvest takes place and many men will be employed in warehouses and other storage facilities. Increasing the number of those who would normally be drawing benefits are those who would normally have been employed during the summer in work out of the province. Work in mainland localities having lessened to some degree, these men are obliged to remain here and draw unemployment benefits. However, a few jobs opened up on northern defence and some were successful in obtaining employment.

Fishing Job At Oil Well In Successful

With the Imperial-MacDougal No. 1 well standing cemented in at 719 feet, drilling operations are expected to resume this afternoon under the direction of the assistant drilling supervisor "Mac" MacIntyre. On Monday morning the drillers had their first fishing job on P. E. I. when a length of casing was lost at the bottom of the hole, and was recovered a few hours later when a special tool was made and successfully recovered the "28-foot fish". The cementing in operation is routine. Cement is poured around the casing which is placed after the initial hole reached a certain depth. Drilling supervisor George KirkPatrick is on holidays.
