Sensational Peter Snell Adds Another Mark Sat.

LOS ANGELES (CP-AP)—New Zealand's sensational Peter Snell added the world indoor record for 1,000 yards to his growing list of conquests by running the distance in two minutes, six seconds here Saturday night.

Hot on his heels was Bill Crothers of University of Toronto, who also bettered the record by finishing in 2:07.4 in the event at the Los Angeles indoor games.

Snell received a tremendous ovation from more than 13,000 fans who attended despite a fierce downpour of rain. Snell was running on an indoor board track for the first time. In outdoors events he set a world mile record of 3:54 in New Zealand Jan. 27, and on Feb. 3 bettered the world marks both for 800 yards and for 800 metres.

CRACKS MILE BARRIER The games also saw little Jim Beatty of Los Angeles become the first runner to crack the four-minute mile indoors. Beatty reeled off the mile in 3:58.9 to eclipse the indoor mark of 4:01.4 set by Ron Delany of Villanova in 1959.

Pinder Rink Takes Title

FREDERICTON (CP) — Mrs. L.A. Pinder and her Moncton Curlers' Association rink captured the New Brunswick women's curling championship Saturday defeating Mrs. Charles Brown of Saint John Carleton 16-3.
The rink also earned a ticket to the Canadian Championships at Regina later this month.
This morning's match ended after eight ends with Mrs. Brown conceding. Members of the Moncton rink include Mrs. H.I. Steeves, Mrs. W.B. Dick and Mrs. C.H. Thomas.

And as an added treat, the new indoor shot put king, Gary Gubner of New York University, got off a toss of 63 feet, eight inches. This bettered the accepted mark of 63 feet, 1 1/4 inches set by Parry O'Brien a year ago, but didn't erase the 63 feet, 10 1/4-inch mark set by Gubner in New York Feb. 2.

Murray Halberg of New Zealand ran away with the two-mile feature, but his time of eight minutes, 42.5 seconds failed to dent the U.S. indoor record of 8:34.3 which Halbert set Jan. 14, 1961 at Portland, Ore.

Bob Schul of Los Angeles was a well-beaten second in 8:55.3 and Bruce Kidd, sensational 18-year-old from Toronto, was third in 9:00.7.

Schul and Kidd swapped second and third places throughout the long run with the Toronto teen-ager seemingly growing tired in the final lap.
The East York Track Club of Toronto finished second in the two-mile relay which wound up the games. A University of Oregon team which had announced it was out to break the U.S. mark of 7:32.8 finished first in 7:33.1 and the Toronto team of George Shepherd, Stan Worsfold, Jim Snider and Crothers was clocked in 7:39.2.
Members of the Oregon team were Ted Abram, Archie San

Romani, Dyrrol Burleson and Sig Ohlmann.
Snell and Halberg booked a flight back to New Zealand Sunday. They are allotted 28 days for out-of-country competition each year and will have 26 days left by hurrying back. Flying time doesn't count.

Ramblers Top Wolverines 4-2 To Win Crown

AMHERST (CP) — Amherst Wolverines 4-2 here Saturday night to win their third straight Nova Scotia Senior Hockey League title.

The victory was Amherst's 32 in 47 games. Ramblers lost 13 and tied two to finish atop the five-team league with 66 points, 18 ahead of Moncton Beavers. New Glasgow Rangers took third spot and Wolves fourth. Windsor Maple Leafs finished out of the playoffs.

Despite the victory, Amherst fans were disappointed when winger Alain Caron failed to score his 77th goal which would have tied or broken a Maritime senior scoring record—depending on which record lists you pick.
According to newspaper records of 1954, Billy Ford of the Old Halifax Atlantics scored 76 goals in Maritime major hockey league play in the 1953-54 schedule. Official MMHL statistics agree with the 76 figure. But the record books of the National Ho-

ney League and the Maritime Amateur Hockey Association show Ford with 77 goals. Caron had some consolation. He scored his total in 30 less games than Ford and won the league scoring title easily.
