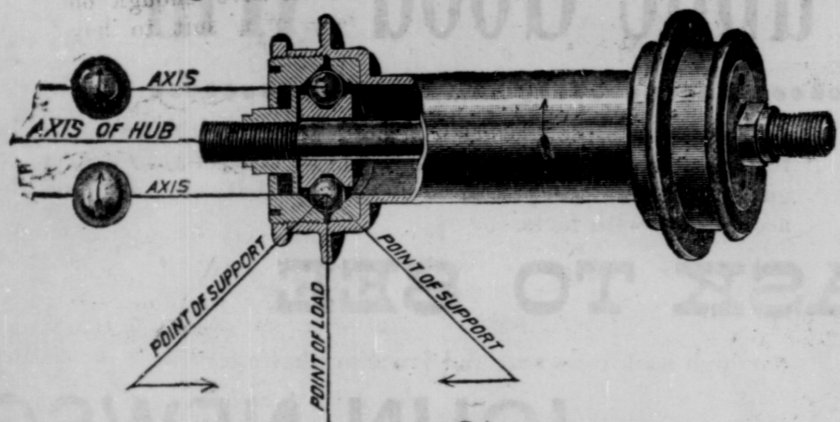

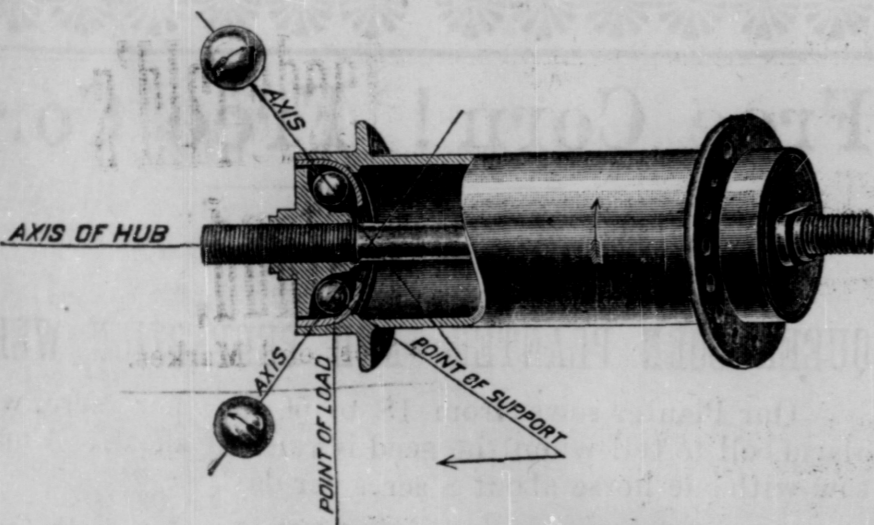

JUBILEE AT TRACADIE.—The people of Tracadie are not forgetful of Dominion Day this jubilee year. We are told that they are already making preparations to celebrate it in a most royal manner by having on that day, in aid of their new church fund, under the name of a tea party, an eclipse celebration with many new and rare attractions. Every person should have an occasional good day's outing, health and strength considered. Be not deceived then, Dominion Day at Tracadie is the time and place.

LONDON, May 18.—The Princess of Wales fund started at the suggestion of Her Royal Highness, to provide a dinner or some substantial meal during the week of the jubilee commemoration for the poorest of the poor of the London slums, received to day an anonymous subscription of £25,000. Lord Mayor Phillips has announced that with the receipt of this donation the fund is closed. The Princess of Wales headed the subscription list with £100.

MONTREAL, May 18.—It is said here that the friends of Hon. Wm. Marchand have asked Premier Flynn to hold the seals of office for another week so as to give the new leader time to complete his cabinet.

NEW YORK, May 18.—The New York and New Haven Railroad will introduce, probably next week, the new electric third-rail system on the section of its lines between New Britain and Hartford, a distance of thirteen miles. It will not be an experiment—that stage is passed—but a permanent substitution of electricity for the steam locomotive. On Monday a car filled with seventy-five passengers was run by electricity between the two cities, at a speed of nearly 100 miles an hour. At the dress rehearsal, with President Clark aboard, the train was run at the rate of fifty miles an hour. President Clark, who is a clear-headed, practical conservative railroad man, believes this new move a forerunner of a revolution in the operation of railroading the world over.
