Large Crowds In Attendance At Ch'town Midnight Masses

Midnight Masses were celebrated in all three Roman Catholic Churches serving Charlottetown and district Wednesday nights. Each church was packed to the doors. Morning masses were also well attended.

At St. Dunstan's Basilica Solemn Pontifical Mass was celebrated at midnight by Most Rev. Malcolm A. MacEachern, D.D., Bishop of Charlottetown. Rt. Rev. Patrick McMahon, rector of the parish was high priest.

The sermon was preached by Rev. Adrien Arsenault of St. Dunstan's University. Prior to the beginning of the Mass, the Basilica mixed choir under the direction of Frank M. MacIntyre, sang a number of traditional carols including "Silent Night", "O Little Town of Bethlehem", "There is Room in My Heart for Thee", and "The Birth of a King".

The Kyrie and Sanctus sung during the Mass were from the Gregorian Chant (Ninth Mass), the Gloria and Credo from Leonard's Mass in E flat, and the Agnus Dei from Concone's Mass. "Adeste Fideles" was sung during the Offertory by Loman MacAulay.

Two Low Masses, the Shepherd's Mass, and the Mass of the Angels were celebrated in the main church following midnight Mass.

HOLY REDEEMER SERVICES At the Church of the Most Holy Redeemer, Solemn High Mass was celebrated by Very Rev. C.H. Moreau, C.S.R., rector of the parish. Rev. F. Gannon of the staff of St. Dunstan's University was deacon of the mass and Rev. Andrew MacDonald C.S.R., of St. Mary's College, Halifax, subdeacon. The sermon was preached by Rev. Michael MacIsaac, C.S.R., former chaplain of the fleet.

Following the completion of this Mass the Shepherds' Mass was celebrated. During this Mass a mixed choir of 35 voices sang a number of traditional Christmas hymns.

One half hour prior to the commencement of Midnight Mass the choir boys formed up in the sacristy and moved in procession to the choir loft where they sang several hymns and carols.

At midnight a procession led by the cross-bearer and two acolytes, followed by 50 altar boys, four little girls dressed as angels, and a young woman dressed as the Virgin Mary entered the church and proceeded to a replica of the Stable of Bethlehem, where a figure of the Divine Infant carried thither by the young woman was placed in the manger.

The beautiful canticle for Advent, "Gloria in Excelsis Deo, Emmanuel", was the first offering of the newly formed Holy Redeemer Boys' Choir, which consists of 20 boys sopranos assisted by 10 other male singers trained and directed by Rev. Denis Gallant, diocesan director of liturgical music. Organist Alex MacLean provided the accompaniment.

The first canticle was followed by the descriptive "Shepherds in the Fields Abiding" and the traditional carol "The First Noel".

The impact of the collision sent the east bound vehicle crashing into the traffic light on the south side of Queen St. The vehicle received extensive damage, while damage to the south bound vehicle was estimated to be \$200.
