Fine Concert Marks Opening Of P.W.C. Series

Music lovers of Charlottetown and vicinity turned out in full force last evening and packed the Prince of Wales College auditorium to hear the first of the P. W. C. concert series.

The large crowd received a definite treat as they heard the excellent performances of the two local artists, Mr. William Keith Rogers, pianist, and Mr. Raoul Raymond, bass.

Although many of the audience had heard Mr. Rogers in organ recitals and had praised his talent in that direction, after hearing his playing last evening they realized that it is at the piano that he is most outstanding.

As soon as Mr. Rogers touches the keyboard the music flows from his fingertips with an ease and confidence born of true talent, backed by years of hard work. He plays with a brilliancy of technique and intelligence of interpretation, both of which were brought out to the full in his "Fantasia" playing of Chopin's "Prelude in G flat".

Mr. Raymond has the pleasant faculty of putting his audience completely at ease as soon as he steps onto the stage, and this personality combined with a most pleasant voice won his listeners completely. His first few numbers seemed to be unknown to his audience, and despite the perfection of his technique it was not until the last number of the program that he received his full share of applause.

Although Mr. Raymond has considerable difficulty with the English language, his accent has an appealing quality which is especially attractive in his singing of "Some Enchanted Evening" from South Pacific. In this number Mr. Raymond made first use of a beautiful head tone which amazed the audience with its clarity and resonance. His voice is always round and true, and has a quality which filled the auditorium and yet could be softened to a whisper.

With these two artists to start them off, it is hoped that in the concert series of the P.W.C., lovers of good music have found a source of entertainment which has been sorely needed in this Province. Last evening's concert was under the distinguished patronage of Lieut. Gov. T. W. L. Prowse and Mrs. Prowse, Chief Justice Thane A. and Mrs. Campbell and Mayor B. Earle MacDonald and Mrs. MacDonald. A reception was held in the College library at which Miss Lily Seaman, Mrs. Frank MacMillan and Mrs. George Patterson presided at the attractive luncheon tables.

Mr. A. J. Haslam, Charlottetown, was elected President of the Fifth Queen's Progressive Conservative Association at a well attended organization meeting held last night in the Clover Club.

Other officers elected were Messrs. Fred DeCoste, Vice President, and C. R. McQuaid, Secretary. Mr. DeCoste acted as chairman at the opening of the meeting.

Hon. Dr. W. J. P. MacMillan, former leader, in a brief speech warmly pledged his support to the new leader, Mr. R. R. Bell. He also paid tribute to the late Hon. Murdoch Kennedy, Mr. J. Lester Douglas, M.P., and Hon. H. H. Cox.

Within minutes Mickey was dead, victim of a hit and run driver in the very spot where Prince was felled.

The two dogs were the best of friends and one was seldom seen without the other. Inseparable in life it seems strange but perhaps appropriate they should join each other in death.

Indiana Championship Won With P. E. I. Seed Potatoes

How champion potato grower Henry W. Emme of Butler, Indiana, produced the highest official yield of potatoes ever recorded in the Indiana 400-bushel Potato Club when he grew 752.55 bushels on the best acre of 17.25 acres in 1949, is told in the current issue of a Washington farm publication "Better Crops With Plant Food."

The key to Mr. Emme's success, as recorded in the article, is that he used Prince Edward Island seed potatoes. "To win the potato championship," says the article, "Mr. Emme planted 33 bushels of certified Prince Edward Island Katahdin seed potatoes to the acre with a planter which put the fertilizer in two bands on each side of the seed pieces. He used 1,000 pounds of 0-9-27 fertilizer in which 100 pounds of sulphur had been mixed. He thinks the sulphur helps prevent potato scab."

"The potatoes were planted on May 11, two to four inches deep in 36-inch rows, and the seed pieces were placed 10 inches apart in the rows. The crop was sprayed with DDT using 100 to 150 gallons per acre at each application."

The article goes on to refer to another contestant, Fred Fraser of Rochester, who won the onion yield contest and was also named State Muck Crop Champion because the yields of his three muck crops were higher than those of the other contestants. His potatoes yielded 601 bushets to the acres and the cabbage 13 tons to the acre.

"He planted certified Prince Edward Island Sebago seed potatoes on May 27, using 25 bushels of seed to the acre," says the article. "One thousand forty pounds of 0-9-27 fertilizer per acre were used, and he dusted five times using COCS and DDT dust."

Former Minister At Eldon Dies WINNIPEG, Nov. 6 (CP)—Rev. Thomas Anderson Rodger, 81, retired Presbyterian minister, died Saturday. He was ordained in Edmonton in 1904 and held pastorates in Owen Sound, Ont., Sydney, N.S., Regina, North Battleford, Sask., and Eldon, P. E. I.

While Moderator of the Alberta Synod he was presented to the King and Queen during their Canadian tour. He was born in Montreal and took part in the Yukon gold rush. At one time he was Y. M. C. A. secretary at Hamilton, where in 1901 he married the former Catherine Alberta Rymall, who survives him.

U. S. CALLS FOR Continued from page 1 declined to speculate on what proposals would be presented to the Council Wednesday. Asked whether Russia will be included in the preparatory talks, Gross said: "We won't rule that out."

Diplomatic sources said the 11-country Council probably will be asked to issue an order repeating earlier U.N. calls to all countries to withhold aid from the North Korean Reds. This request could be worded so as not to name the Chinese Communists specifically.

After issuance of such an order, the informants said, there probably will be some sort of waiting period to see if the Chinese Communists pull out of Korea. Some observers thought the Council may call for further investigation at the scene, even though MacArthur's report was in such detail as to eliminate all chance of mistaken identity.

There was corridor speculation that Russia may come forward with a cease-fire proposal coupled with an appeal to the Chinese Reds and the U.N. troops to pull back and try to negotiate a settlement.

The obvious objection to such a suggestion, from the non-Communist point of view, is that it would leave the North Korean Reds in possession of a narrow strip of Korean territory despite the General Assembly's decision that all Korea must be unified.

Russia could be expected to veto any firm Council action against the Chinese Reds. Presumably this would throw the problem to the veto-free Assembly, which at this session has armed itself with emergency powers to combat aggression.

The band will be heard in selections played during the main show in the arena on the evening of Prince Edward Island Day.

Twenty-eight members of the band under the direction of Bandmaster Thomas MacFarlane will make the trip in charge of the Adjutant, Captain R. J. Mahar. They will go to Amherst in a chartered bus returning on a late crossing of the car ferry Abegweit tomorrow night.
