DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

Debate on the Budget.

Dr. Montague Belivers one of the Best Speeches of the Session.

OTTAWA, July 8.

The House of Commons was occupied yesterday's session in the consideration of the budget. Dr. Montague spoke for nearly three hours, delivering one of the ablest speeches of the session and tearing Sir Richard Cartwright's speech into shreds and tatters. The House and galleries were crowded.

Mr. John Charlton followed in a dreary speech which quickly emptied the galleries. Hon. Mr. Chapleau appeared yesterday for the first time since his accident on crutches. He was warmly received, and Cartwright crossed the floor to welcome him.

THE TARTE-McGREGGIE CASE

A Sensational Episode.

While Making Havoc of His Evidence on Direct Examination, Murphy Breaks Down and is Carried Away in a Fit.

OTTAWA, July 8.

In the Tarte-McGreggie investigation, Murphy's cross examination was continued. His memory was very bad yesterday. He could remember nothing about the payment of \$10,000 to Sir Hector Langevin—neither time nor place nor anything about it; but he swore that he paid it. No entry can be found of any such payment, or of anything that looks like it. He was making fearful havoc of his evidence when he suddenly fell in a fit, and the committee adjourned. Murphy was confined to his bed last evening, and is reported very ill, and possibly may not attend the investigation again for some time.

Spurgeon Dying.

LONDON, July 8.

Spurgeon, the great Baptist preacher, is dying. He was one of the most remarkable men of his day. Before he was eighteen years of age he became pastor of the small Baptist congregation at Waterbeach. In 1853 he was called to a Baptist chapel in Southwork, London, to which he attracted such crowds that the congregation was forced to remove first to Exeter Hall and then to Clancy Music Hall. In 1861 a new chapel, capable of seating about 6,000 persons, was completed in Newington Butts. Spurgeon founded a ministerial college and built many chapels. His sermons have been printed weekly and published collectively in many volumes. He has also published "The Saint and his Saviour," "Gleanings Among the Sheaves," "Types and Emblems," "Lectures to my Students," and other works.

Murderers Executed.

NEW YORK, July 8.

Four murderers were executed by electricity yesterday morning, at Sing Sing. There were no delays or accidents. The work was done instantly.

Fishery Bulletin.

(Fisheries Intelligence Bureau Report.)

HALIFAX, July 7.—In Anticosti the fisheries are reported the same as yesterday. The caplin being very good at south-west point and the cod fair, but no bait or fish at any other ports. The reports for Quebec are: codfishing good at St. John's River and Long Point, fair at Seven Islands, Perce and Newport, and Point Launce. Very plentiful at St. John River, Long Point, and Seven Islands. Salmon very good at St. John River, and Merigon, and fair at Long Point. Herring poor at Seven Islands and Perce, but good at Newport point. In P. E. Island mackerel are reported taking hook freely along the north coast, from Miquigash round to Alberton; cod, herring and lobsters at Port Hood, haddock, herring, mackerel fair at Port Hood, cod, herring and lobsters at Margaree, and cod at Mabou and Cheticamp. Herring at North Sydney, cod very good at L'Ardoise, and cod, herring and mackerel fair at Arichat. The net fishing was poor to-day at St. Peter's, owing to a thunder storm last night. The schooner Victoria arrived there from eastern banks with fifty quintals of cod. All fisheries are reported poor at Lunenburg, but the cod, herring and mackerel fishery are fair at Lockport, and mackerel are reported schooling to-day off Barrington Bay. The cod fishery did very well last week at Caraquet and Shipagan.

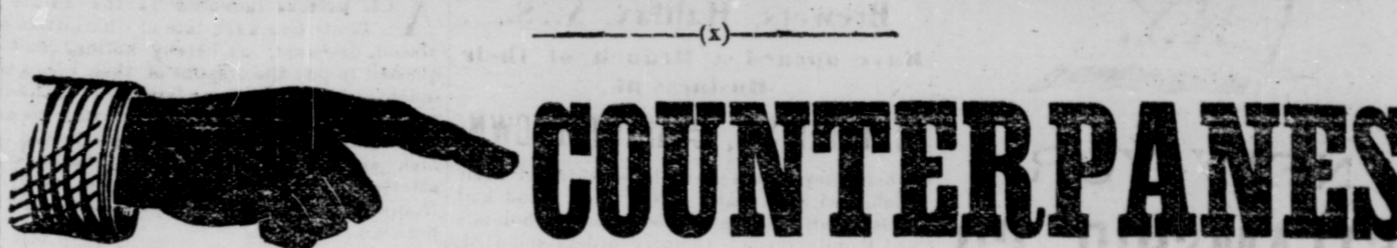
