A REASSURING STATEMENT.

Government will not Discriminate Against Great Britain,

What is Sought is the Reciprocal Abolition of Duties on Raw Products.

OTTAWA, Nov. 19.—Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Sir Louis Davies have returned from Washington.

There was a lengthy meeting of the Cabinet yesterday which they attended and at which their mission to Washington was discussed.

After the Cabinet meeting, Sir Wilfrid received the newspaper correspondents to whom he made the following statements: "You may say, emphatically, that there is no intention whatsoever of negotiating any reciprocity treaty which would interfere with or affect Canada's existing British preferential tariff. What has been discussed, however, is the reciprocal abolition of duties on coal, lumber, fish, hay, potatoes, barley, eggs, and other similar articles. I am in hopes that our informal negotiations will be followed by more formal ones."

LATEST NEWS BY WIRE AND MAIL

ST. PETERSBURG, Nov. 17.—It is estimated that about 1,800 persons were rendered homeless by the rising of the waters of the Neva, the flooding of the Canvi, the suburbs and the outlying portions of the city, through the fierce wind from the sea which drove the waters up the stream, sweeping away several bridges. The police are providing lodging and food for the homeless.

CORRUNA, Nov. 17.—There is a violent campaign here for and against a popular demonstration in honor of General Weyler, the former captain-general of Cuba, when he arrives here from Havana, via Gibara and Porto Rico. The moderate republicans and Catholics are in favor of a demonstration and are doing everything possible to organize a reception for the general. On the other hand the republicans, liberals and socialists are organizing against the demonstration. The general public is indifferent. General Weyler's son was serenaded today on his arrival from Cuba.

NEW YORK, November 18.—A Journal special from Paris says: The Count and Countess of Castellane have signed title deeds for the purchase of a large site in Rue Pierre Charron, which is to be given by the Countess for the erection of a permanent building for an annual charity bazaar. This site cost 1,000,000 francs, which sum the Countess contributed for the purchase of land shortly after the recent catastrophe in the temporary charity bazaar in Rue Jean Coignon. In a letter written by her several months ago to Baron McKaw she stated that she had determined to devote to the memory of her mother 1,000,000 francs to a building in which charitable entertainments could be given. Carrying out her purpose at this time will do much to set a rest to the many stories afloat in Paris concerning the depleted condition of the Castellane treasury. The lavish expenditure of the Count in his gambling, bric-a-brac, new mansion on Avenue du Bois de Boulogne, his palatial yacht Valhalla, and the 400,000 francs, etc., gave rise to these stories. A recent visit of George Gould to this city was understood in this connection to have been for the purpose of putting a check to the wild extravagance. The new home of the Castellanes, as it is planned, will be the largest house in Paris. To follow the design, the grand Trianon, in Park Versailles will be about one-half its size. So far the new Trianon has cost about three times the original estimate. The ground alone cost 4,700,000 francs.

MADRID, November 17.—The Spanish cabinet this evening discussed Cuban autonomy, the principal basis of which are the enjoyment of all the rights accorded by the Spanish constitution without any curtailment whatever: The identity of political and civil rights for Spaniards and Cubans without distinction of race or color and the creation of a Cuban chamber, all the members of which are to be elected by popular vote. A Cuban senate is to be created later on. The chamber is to be empowered to vote the budget expenditure, make laws controlling public services, establish customs tariffs and decide the relative responsibility of the executive officers. The motherland will have exclusive control of international affairs, military and naval matters and of the organization of the tribunals. Spain also retains the direction of the political and civil laws of a national character and retains control of the expenditures of the same character. The executive power will be vested in a governor-general with deputies appointed by himself. Both the governor-general and his deputies will be responsible to the Cuban chamber.

LONDON, Nov. 17.—The Berlin correspondent of the Times says: Not only the radical, but the clerical journals, are of opinion that the conflict with the republic of Hayti and the attack on the missionaries in China will be used to influence German public feeling in favor of extensive naval plans. Various journals, meanwhile, continue to urge the government to make prompt measures for reparation in Hayti. The Neueste Nachrichten considers the action of Hayti not only an offence to the dignity of Germany, but an insult to Emperor William. The insinuation in the documents published in the Monitor that Germany had been acting as if she contemplated a protectorate of Hayti, is described as a ruse to excite the mistrust of other powers particularly the United States. It is said in official quarters that the government is considering sending an imperial commissioner to Port au Prince with the German warships.

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Nov. 17.—Governor Murray today cancelled the appointments made by the defeated Whiteway administration. A commission to reform the civil service has been appointed, consisting of Attorney-General Winter, Receiver-General Morine, and Hon. George Shea. The commission on the reform of the tariff will commence work in December. Departmental by-elections will take place on December 6th, nominations November 29th. Startling revelations of corruption under the Whiteway government are expected.

ROME, Nov. 17.—The congregation of the propaganda has submitted to the pope a report of three candidates for the archbishopric of New Orleans. The probabilities favor the most Rev. P. L. Chapelle, archbishop of Santa Fe, N. M., unless His Holiness desires to take the opportunity and send most Rev. John L. Keane, former rector of the Catholic University.

MADRID, Nov. 17.—The report that the government intends, in return for his services as governor general of Cuba to appoint General Weyler governor general of the Philippines, is officially denied.
