King's County Legion Elects Zone Chairman

The annual King's County zone rally of the Canadian Legion B.E.S.L. was held in the Canadian Legion Hall at Georgetown on Wednesday evening, Nov. 21. A. Patterson, president of the Georgetown branch welcomed the delegates from the various branches and other guests. Mr. Roddy Martin, zone chairman, officiated. W. J. Fitzgerald of Georgetown acted as secretary.

The Canadian Legion provincial president, Arthur Peake, provincial secretary James Walker, Queen's County zone chairman Roy McGillivray, Lt.-Col. Keith Johnston, deputy administrator of D.V.A., Dr. R. D. MacNeill, T.N.A., E. J. and Major J. A. MacDonald, provincial treasurer of the Legion were in attendance and addressed the meeting.

Question Period

A general question period followed the opening of the meeting in which all present were privileged to put questions to the D.V.A. panel of experts and Provincial Command officers. The following resolutions were passed to be forwarded to the Dominion Command:

Resolved that the War Veterans Allowance Act be immediately amended to reflect a basic increase in the allowances payable under this act by at least 33 1/3 per cent to compensate for the steadily increasing cost of living.

Be it further resolved that the permissible earned income of recipients under the said act be extended a proportionate amount.

Be it resolved that the various requirements for small holdings under the Veterans Land Act be reduced to a half-acre.

Whereas costs of construction, stock and equipment for both farming, fishing and small holdings have greatly increased since the enactment of the Veterans Farm Act, be it therefore resolved that the said act be immediately amended to provide for an increase in the maximum amount of assistance permissible under the said act, commensurate with the increase costs set out above.

The business meeting of the zone followed. J. W. Lavers of Georgetown was appointed King's County zone chairman for the ensuing year. Ralph Sanders of Morell was appointed deputy zone chairman. The zone chairman will select his own secretary.

At the conclusion of the business meeting, all present enjoyed a delicious lunch provided by the Ladies Auxiliary of the Georgetown Branch of the Canadian Legion.
