This is educative to the person who will be educated. The nursing profession owes a great deal to the life of Florence Nightingale. We are told that she spent ten years in training at one place or another. Her career as a nurse is identified with the Crimean War. Conditions among the wounded then were terrible, and many of the wounded died. Her report awakened not only England but the world and the work of the nurse took on new meaning. Hospitals were better equipped, and the result was that thousands of lives were saved. It saddens one in such a time as this to think of those who died in such distress. This is what one writer says about her and her work: Her devotion to the sufferers can never be forgotten. She would stand twenty-four hours at a stretch, in order to see them provided with accommodation and all the requisites of their condition, and a few months after her arrival, she had ten thousand men under her care. Her work broke her down, but she refused to leave her post. At the close of the Crimean War, a fund of 50,000 pounds was raised so that she might form an institution for the training of nurses. In 1860 the first training school for nurses was opened in London in connection with St. Thomas Hospital. It was called the Nightingale Fund Training School for Nurses. Prior to this time, a trained nurse was almost unknown and the care of the sick fell to those who knew little about their work, except what Mother Nature had given them. Florence Nightingale awakened the world to the need of training. Longfellow's "Santa Filomena" was written in her praise.

'Tween life and death a mediator, you Plead much that Motherhood be left awhile; That tender buds be not untimely slain. Down many a mist-encompassed valley, too You go with travellers their last, Or bring them back to golden days again."

Gerald Waring Reporting

The amendment to the Judges Act which gives 296 jurists in the Exchequer and Provincial Courts 20 per cent increases in salaries was put through Parliament late in the session partly for a curious reason. That was to induce some judges to retire.

As one Cabinet minister admitted privately, a half dozen judges were believed to be holding back their resignations in the expectation that judges' salaries would be increased. By staying on the bench until after salaries were boosted, they could ensure that they'd benefit by a similar 20 per cent increase in their retirement pensions.

These are judges who have been ailing — many for a long time — but who were loath to give up their big paying jobs. Now that pensions as well as salaries have been increased, the Government hopes they will be less reluctant to step down and make room for younger men who can handle the work.

If the Government had shelved the bill until fall, as some MP's urged it to do, there would have been merely a further delay in retirements and new appointments.

Chummy again: Newfoundland Premier Joe Smallwood and Newfoundland's Federal Cabinet minister, State Secretary Bradley. After being at loggerheads for nearly two years, they made up when Bradley flew to St. John's a few weeks ago. It took them until 4 A. M. to smooth over their grievances against each other.

Liberal again: J. H. Rousseau, the crippled septuagenarian who ran as an Independent Liberal in the Kamoussi, Que., by-election last fall and defeated the official Liberal candidate, has been accepted into the Liberal fold. He made his peace with the Liberal organization in his riding, and was welcomed to the Liberal caucus of MP's at Ottawa four days before

the season ended. Postponed: The junket of MP's to the West Coast which Arthur Laing (Lib., Vancouver South) had hoped to lead next month has been put off for a year. Reason is that B. C. Premier Byron Johnson doesn't want the MP's there this year because it might embarrass him in his present political difficulties. Johnson heads a Coalition Government which is rapidly drifting towards a breakup into its Liberal and Progressive Conservative components.

Ingenious out: Constitutional experts deride the Government for taking refuge behind the oath of Cabinet secrecy when it refused to disclose the "cabinet directive" under which Transport Minister Chevrier acted to exempt the Ming Sung ships from provisions of the Shipping Act. The argument of Council secrecy isn't valid, they say, because anything done in Council may be revealed with the Crown's permission, and the Crown acts on the advice of the Prime Minister. So the Government's refusal to tell Progressive Conservative leader George Drew what really happened in Cabinet on the Ming Sung matter amounted to admission that "we won't advise the Crown to give us the necessary permission to tell you."

Counting chickens: Ralph Maybank, who resigned as MP for Winnipeg South Centre to accept a Manitoba judgeship, may be wondering if he acted prematurely. For two months, instead of being on the bench, he's been on the beach — The beach of his Island summer place in the Lake of the Woods, waiting for Mr. Justice Major to retire and make room for him.
