A group of U. N. troops are pictured going off the dock at Hungnam, Korea, into an awaiting LST, as evacuation of all Allied troops in this beachhead was successfully carried out. An army totalling

105,000 fighting men, complete with their equipment, 100,000 civilians and hundred of thousands of tons of war material were evacuated from this last Allied stronghold in northern Korea. This was the first time in history that an entire army had been redeployed by sea in the face of enemy's pressure.



George P. Hope, 30, of Windsor, Ont., when single-engine, two-seater Chipmunk plane he was piloting crashed.



shown at left, crashed in the brush at the edge of a swamp on a farm in West Zorra township. Hope, right, was the only occupant of the plane. The wings were crushed and the engine shoved back against the pilot. There was no fire. Wreckage was scattered for several hundred feet about the scene of crash.

**WINS FELLOWSHIP FOR CANCER STUDY**
