P.E.I. Council of Women's Bursary: The P.E.I. Council of Women is offering a bursary at UPEI. This award is made annually on the recommendation of the Scholarship Committee in consultation with Marion Basha to a student of mature years, female, full-time in any year. Deadline: Friday, Oct.

9, 1981.
Commonwealth Scholarship: The Commonwealth Scholarships and Fellowship Plan provides scholarships for foreign studies, mainly for postgraduates. Deadline: October 31, 1981.
The Rhodes Scholarship Trust: The Rhodes Scholarships are awarded to assist students who wish to attend the University of Oxford. Applicants must have completed at least three years of university work by October 1, 1982. Deadline: October 26, 1981.

Bell Notes

Baddeck, N.S. - Fifty-nine years after his death, inventive genius Alexander Graham Bell's "home notes" may begin to shed light on abandoned technology as important today as his telephone and flying machine were in their time.

Bell's "home notes" are his day-to-day handwritten work notes and memos to associates and staff, as he carried out extensive research prior to and during his years at his famous laboratory, workshops, and home, at his beloved Beinn Breagh on a headland across the bay from Baddeck on Cape Breton Island.

More than 500 volumes of his notes, working papers and personal letters touching every aspect of his life and his research into such diverse areas as medicine, aeromautics, marine

engineering, genetics, electricity, sound and speech, are preserved today in a special room of the Alexander Graham Bell Complex within the Alexander Graham Bell National Historic Park in Baddeck.

Bell's notes and letters could open doors to abandoned technology with tremendous potential today. They could reveal pathways to new discoveries, they could shed new light on the lives of Bell and his family, his friends, and associates.

It's all there for the serious researcher, scientist, scholar, author.

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
