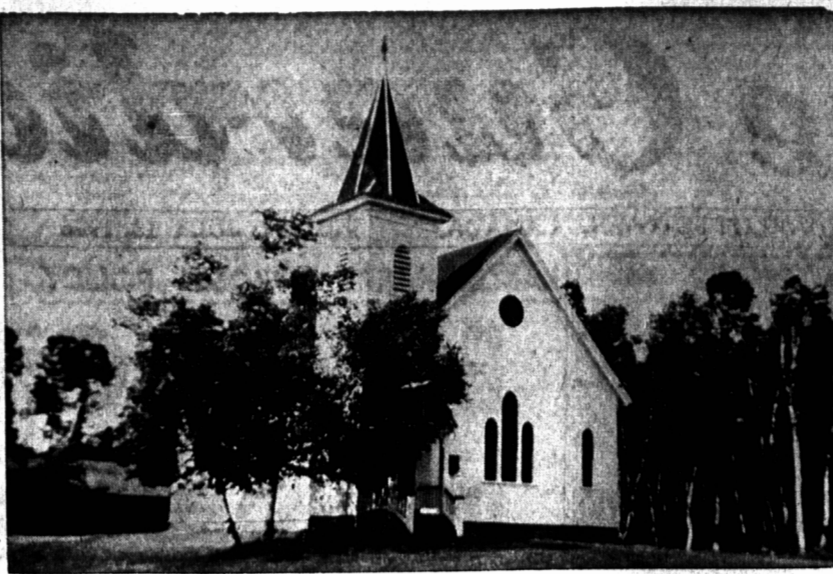

Proposes \$20,000 Insurance For Armed Services Members

OTTAWA (CP)—Government-paid life insurance of at least \$20,000 for every member of the armed services was proposed in the Commons Thursday by a CCF member.

"There is a moral obligation to protect these young men in every way," Owen L. Jones, member for Okanagan Boundary in British Columbia, said.

The problem of service men who are killed while not on active service arose as the Commons debated the departmental estimates of Veterans Affairs Minister Lapointe.

Mr. Jones said that one soldier, who had served three years in Germany, was killed during a civilian car accident. His widow and two children had received nothing from the government and were living on charity.

"Whether or not a man is on duty, I submit he is still a soldier," he said. There should be protection for the family of every man joining the forces against accident or death, with payment of at least \$20,000 in case of death.

A succession of opposition members reiterated demands for improvement in provisions of the war veterans allowance—a payment to needy veterans of active combat and their widows.

Lt.-Col. Lapointe replied to the main demand: "The income ceiling on the means test payment be raised in line with Canadian legion requests to \$1,200 a year for single recipients and \$2,000 for married veterans. The present ceiling—the allowance plus other income—is \$840 and \$1,440 for single and married veterans.

He said that to meet the request would add some 30 per cent to the present allowance cost of \$41,192,000 a year. The allowance had to be kept in line with other veterans benefits, such as disability pensions.

Col. Lapointe said that last year 6,359 veterans were treated in hospitals at a cost of \$2,256,563. The patients were charged \$546,726 of that amount, the remainder being paid by veterans hospital insurance plan.

Chief of detectives Stuyvesant Pinell discussed with reporters details of the ransom note not hitherto publicized. He told them:

"The note had 35 or more words in it, which certainly points to premeditation and preparation."

The grammar was correct and apparently the work of an adult. Handwriting experts, however, have been unable to determine the age or sex of the writer.

As for the kidnapper, Pinell said:

"It could be a man or a woman, two men or even two women."

Farmers' Federation Asks For Tax Assessment Readjustment

Readjustment of assessment for School Tax purposes was one of the items contained in the resolutions passed at the semi-annual meeting of the Queens County Federation of Agriculture held at Hunter River, Wednesday night.

In the resolution it was pointed out that farmers are taxed on the worth of their property (land) regardless of annual income while business or professional workers

are taxed only on their personal property. It was urged that a study be made of this question so that existing inequalities could be ironed out. A further resolution commended the Department of Agriculture for its weed control policy but asked that greater publicity be given the policy since it was obvious that a great many farmers were not taking advantage of it.
