Tea is truly our national beverage and is drunk at least once a day by 75 per cent of all Canadians over the age of ten. Over 50 per cent of regular tea drinkers enjoy three or more cups a day and one tea drinker in ten consumes ten or more cups a day. It appears however, that the more tea drunk by an individual the less is his strength. Few Canadians if any, can however equal the record claimed by the Australian who reports he drinks 90 cups every day!

According to Tea Council of Canada the ideal brew is when you get about 200 cups from every pound of packaged tea and 240 cups from tea bags.

It must be remembered that the water must be brought to a bubbly boil before it is poured on the tea. The pot should be warmed and the quantity of tea used not be less than a teaspoonful for every cup and one for the pot. In the case of two cups of tea, one tea bag provides two cups of tea. Tea needs to be brewed for a full five minutes before it is drunk. By following these simple instructions it is possible to enjoy an excellent cup of tea every time.

Cashew Tree Earns Dollars
COCHIN, India (Reuters)—Cashew nuts are becoming a big dollar earner for India.

This country holds a virtual monopoly of the cashew nut trade and now is planning large-scale expansion of the industry.

The small groves of cashew trees, which thrive in the humid tropical climate of the Malabar coast, yield not only nut kernels for eating, but also a highly-prized oil for making paints and varnishes, and fruit for preserves and syrups.

The cashew tree, with its broad, oval leaves and whitish bark, is capable of yielding about 100 pounds of fruit a year for about 30 years. It was introduced to India about 400 years ago by the Portuguese.
