Work With Canadian Indians Discussed At Kensington

"The Universal Mission of the Church" was the topic for worship at the March meeting of the Kensington United Church Auxiliary of the W.M.S. The president, Mrs. Alexander MacKay conducted the worship and was assisted by Mrs. L.M. Murray who led in prayer.

Many valuable inferences were learned from the Bible study of the Book of Jonah, the first tract written to promote education in world mission. It is a plea for a larger conception of God as one who has a passionate concern for all his children of whatever nation. He wills that men shall be brothers and it is man's obstinate stupidity which frustrates God's plan.

The study on the "Canadian Indians", using the method of interview was carried out by Mrs. Alexander MacKay, representing John Q. (General Public), seeking information concerning the Canadian Indian, and the part played by the Federal Government. (Mrs. Ernest MacEwen) The Church (Mrs. Murdoch MacLeod) and the Indian People (Mrs. Harold Laird). There are approximately 153,000 Indians in Canada and the Church is becoming alert to the contribution it can make in the integration of the Indian People as they move from reserves to the cities. The United Church maintains 58 Indian Missions, 21 ordained missionaries, 29 lay leaders, six residential schools and six hospitals all west of and in Ontario.

The W.M.S. also has 16 women in Christian Education work, as well as nurses, teachers and doctors. As a W.M.S. member one can help by encouraging young energetic people to enlist in some part of this work and to seek out the Indian in your own community. It was interesting to note that two young men known to some of the members are engaged in work among the Indians.

The days go, as those of the Winter too have flown. Not so long ago "the ploughmen" turned back furrows through the whitening fields" of November. Now it is the March-weeks that pass smartly away.
