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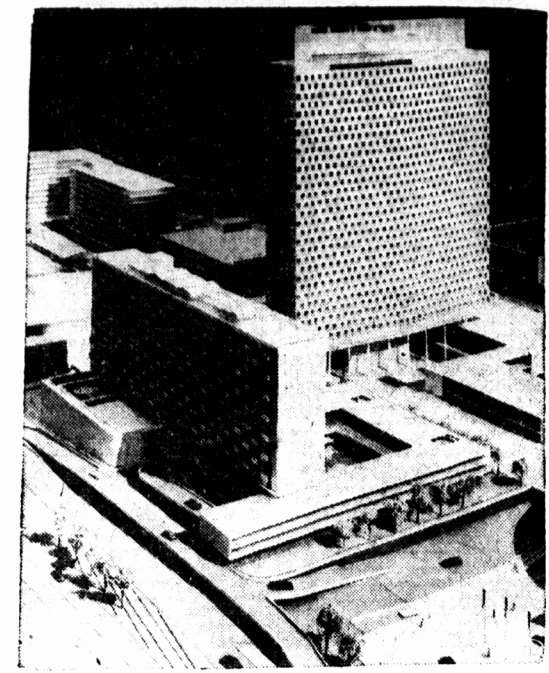

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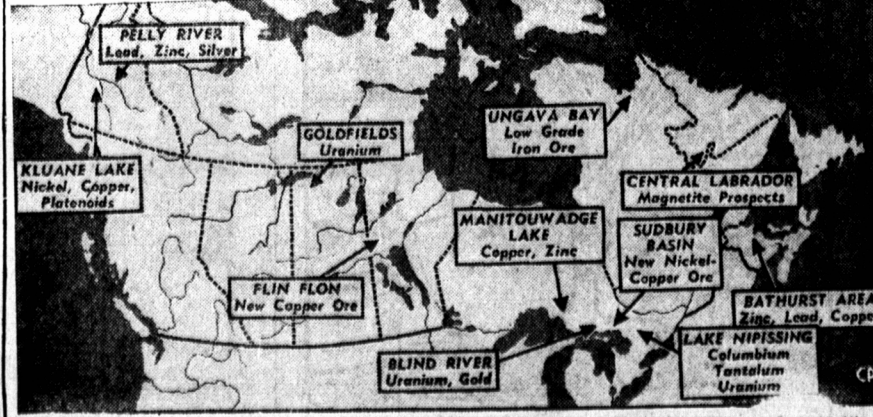
Canadians Neglect Culture More Than Any Country—Lismer

MONTREAL, (CP)—Dr. Arthur Lismer, educational supervisor of the Museum of Fine Arts here, said Monday the Canadian people neglect their universities and schools of art and young folk "have fewer national and provincial opportunities to study with adequate support than in most other countries."

Addressing the Canadian Club, Dr. Lismer said: "We are victims of a mass attack of sordid, tasteless and useless objects—the products of cheap, industrialized, mechanical efficiency—more than any country in the world."

He said we live in a period when "cultural chaos is the experience of every living being and beauty has been relegated to the museums."

"Our stores are full of things that people cannot use and yet the native arts, the creations and designs of individual artists, are neglected."



BOOM IN MINE EXPLORATION—Canadian mining exploration had a busy year in 1953. From Newfoundland to the Yukon prospecting and developing parties reported important finds in New Brunswick zinc, lead and copper ore bodies were being studied. Uranium in Saskatchewan, nickel, copper and platenoids in the Yukon and magnetite and low-grade iron ore in Labrador were among the fields being opened.
