However, it is expected they will deal with only the most essential business. All are tired from the hot-weather campaign and plan to take some holidays. Then the prime minister will go on holiday until after Labor Day unless anything arises to call him back to work.

Mr. St. Laurent is expected to hold some informal talks today with those of his ministers who will be here and to catch up with his correspondence. The cabinet session will take most of Thursday.

Norma Marie Pontiac, owned by Colby C. Lewis of Freetown yesterday won the Grand and Senior female championships in the Holstein classes yesterday at the Provincial Exhibition for the third consecutive year.

Roland Paynter of French River and Almon Boswell of Marshfield shared top honors yesterday in the very high quality swine show at the Provincial Exhibition.

Paynter, who made what was probably his best showing at the Island Fair, showed the grand champion and junior champion sow as well as five hirs, a second, a third, and two fifth placings.

He won the grand female championship with Paynter's Express. This sow earlier had won the junior championship ribbon.

Almon Boswell showed very strong in the male classes. He won the junior, senior and grand championships in the boar classes and also had three firsts, two seconds, a third and a fourth.

The senior championship sow was shown by S. C. Stewart and Sons of Dunstaffnage. The Stewart's had one second placing, three thirds, three fourths and a fifth.

The show although smaller than in past years, contained high quality animals as the leading Island breeders exhibited some of their finest Yorkshires. The pigs were judged by Donald A. Stewart of Pussich, Ontario.

F. J. MacInnis of Cherry Valley was among the leading exhibitors with two second placings, a third a fourth and a sixth.

William Found and Andrew Bain of French River, and Rowell Boswell of Frenchfort also had a number of good placings.

Pro Golfer Speaks At Rotary Meeting

Mr. Sam Kerr, professional golfer at the Summerside Golf and Country Club, was guest speaker at the regular weekly meeting of the Summerside Rotary Club yesterday.

Mr. Kerr gave an interesting talk on golfing, and recommended the sport as among the best in helping one to keep physically fit and in good health.

Mr. Kerr, who is 37 years of age, has been playing golf for twenty-five years.

Rangers Acquire Bentley Brothers

NEW YORK (AP) — New York Rangers Tuesday acquired the Bentley brothers—Doug and Max—two of the biggest names in hockey. At the same time they announced Frank Boucher will coach the National Hockey League team next season.

Boucher, who coached the Rangers from 1941 to 1948 and has been manager of the organization since 1943, succeeds Bill Cook. Cook, who with brother Ben and Boucher, formed the greatest line in Ranger history, will be retained in some capacity.

Max, younger of the Bentley brothers, was purchased from Toronto Maple Leafs for an undisclosed sum. The 34-year-old centre, a veteran of 11 seasons in the NHL, was sidelined by injuries during most of last season after scoring goals in his first 11 games.

He led the league in scoring in 1945-46 and 1946-47. His 25-goal record is surpassed only by Montreal's Maurice Richard among active players.

Doug, 37, was induced to leave his job as player-coach of the Saskatoon club in the Western Hockey League to rejoin his brother. The famous pair teamed up to star for six years with Chicago Black Hawks.

Doug has agreed to report to the Rangers' training camp at Saskatoon Sept. 12. If his work is satisfactory, he will be signed as a player and assistant coach to Boucher. A big league star at forward for 12 years, Doug accumulated 531 points, third highest in the history of the league. He led the league in scoring in 1942-43 and 1943-44.

He is 41-year-old Lionel Conacher, Canada's greatest all-round athlete who was re-elected as Liberal in Toronto Trinity in the general election. Conacher has held the seat since the 1949 election and beat three other men. They were Tim Buck, leader of the Labor-Progressive party, S. W. Frolick, a Progressive Conservative, and Herman Vouden, a CCFer.

Malenkov Seeks Guns and Butter For Soviet People

By Don Dallas LONDON (Reuters)—Russia has been busily building heavy industry and armaments since the war and now Premier Georgi Malenkov has decided the time has come to give the Soviet people butter as well as guns.

A detailed study of his speech to the USSR Supreme Soviet, an analysis of Russian budget proposals and subsequent Soviet press comment show firm pledges to improve both the quality and quantity of consumer goods.

Food has been rationed since December, 1947, but the price of butter, meat and many other staples has been beyond the purses of masses.

The big Moscow hotels serve meals as luxurious as any in the West but at a cost several times as great.

Clothes production has been poor and shoddy. Western women who have visited Russia all speak of the shapeless, baggy style of mass produced women's clothing — and of the high price. Russian-made shoes have always been clumsily made and expensive.

Heavy industry at present employs about 70 per cent of all industrial workers in Russia.

Now the first stage of Russia's post-war build-up is over. Malenkov reported to the Supreme Soviet and announced a limited let-up in the post-war austerity.

This was a shrewd move on his part calculated to popularize his post-Stalin regime.

Ontario Men

It was during these duels that Cormier and the Pointer, his record of 2:07. Harvey was the leading driver in the Maritimes in 1951, scoring ninety heats and winning 55. He was the winner of the P. H. Consols Trophy that year. The fastest horse in his stable at present is Historian, which has been miles around 2:08. Others are Becky Smith, who was a winner yesterday; Sister Verna Hoo, and Sister Mary.

Mr. Orsi, who was a delegate from Argentina to the international convention of Y's Men at Darvport, Ohio, is at present visiting various clubs to which he brings greetings from his native country and in an informal talk last evening he discussed conditions and mainly in relation to the work of the Y.M.C.A. and Y's Men's Clubs.

He said that the Y.M.C.A. in his native city of Rosario had been established in 1928 and that the Y was situated in one of the most desirable parts of the city. It was equipped, he said, with a splendid gymnasium and well supported, receiving no grant of any kind from the government. He said that the official religion of his country was Catholic and that there was complete freedom of worship there.

He spoke to some extent on the educational system in his homeland where education is compulsory for children up to the age of thirteen years. While boys and girls go to the same schools they attend at different periods, the boys in the morning and the girls in the afternoon.

The national sport is English soccer and basketball and volleyball were also great favorites.

No Communism existed in his country. He said, on being questioned regarding the dictatorship form of government which exists there, he said that the lower class of the people were quite satisfied with it but that the middle and upper class of the people did not favor it.
