

# Employees' Bus Service Would Ease Town Parking

SUMMERSIDE — Members of the local board of trade expressed increasing concern last night at their monthly meeting over the problem of parking the town and were unanimous in their opinion that a solution should be sought immediately. One member stated that much of the parking space in the business area was taken up by employees of firms, leaving no space for customers to park. One suggestion made was that a bus service be operated in the town for employees. This, it was felt, would cut down on the acute parking space shortage now being faced in the business section.

After much discussion a motion was passed that the board's retail merchants committee arrange for a meeting with representatives of the town council to work towards an answer to this predicament.

The board president, Francis "Ginger" MacQuarrie, told the meeting that he and two other board members had met with an Eastern Provincial Airways representative Tuesday night in Charlottetown on the matter of flight schedules to and from Summerside.

**STOP CANCELED**

He stated that as of May 15 the "early bird" flight from Moncton will no longer stop at Summerside but will proceed directly to Charlottetown.

Mr. MacQuarrie added that a suggestion had been made to the airline representative that ground transportation be provided for residents of this area for the early morning flight which will arrive in Charlottetown at approximately 7:35 a.m. The board members were also told by the representative that due to an extreme shortage of planes the airline will be using DC-3's only on their three daily flights to and from the Island.

The change in the schedule possibly could create another problem in that incoming mail will be taken straight to Charlottetown and then have to be transported here.

**MAIL DAY LATE**

As a result the mail could be as much as a day late in being delivered in that it would arrive too late at the post office here to be sorted prior to the carriers going on deliveries in the morning.

With two daily mail deliveries being confined to the business section of the town only the mail for the residential areas would not be delivered until the day following its arrival here.

A committee of two was appointed to meet with the local postmaster to see if some adjustment could be made with deliveries in order that the mail go out the same day as it arrives.

Another matter which met with much concern, especially with operators of businesses in the Read's Corner area, was the government's tentative plans for a large traffic circle at Read's Corner. This circle is one of two plans for the corner area in the all-weather highway construction scheduled to get underway as soon as conditions permit.

It was felt that a large circle would be detrimental to the area and Mr. MacQuarrie told the meeting he had made arrangements to see the plans today in Charlottetown and he would report back to the board later.

Although store hours in the town were discussed at length length there were no new developments.

## Shaw Will Open Geo'town Plant

GEORGETOWN — It was announced here yesterday by T. W. Sanderson, president of Bathurst Marine Ltd., that Premier Walter R. Shaw has accepted an invitation to officially open the Bathurst Marine shipyard during a special ribbon-cutting ceremony May 22 at 2:30.

At the ceremony Mrs. Shaw has consented to officially name the steel trawler which, up to now during the construction process, has been known as "hull no. 12". The naming ceremony will be held in the large fabrication shop building where this 129-foot trawler, the first to be built in Georgetown, is now in an advanced state of construction.

A large crowd is expected to be on hand for the gala opening ceremonies and distinguished persons have been invited from Ottawa and Europe. In addition, provincial government officials and civic dignitaries from across the province will be in attendance.

During the afternoon the visitors will be taken on a tour of the new Gulf-Garden-Foods plant, and will also visit the new housing project situated on the north side of Georgetown.
