THERE was a report on the street this morning that Mayor Dawson had declined to open Wards One and Five, and application was to be made to the Supreme Court to compel his doing so. We have ascertained that the Mayor wrote Councillors Morris and Horne, asking them to act as returning officers. They declined. He then at once obtained the services of A. H. Yates and B. Lawson, Esqrs., to act in that capacity. In a letter which we publish elsewhere, Mr. Horne states the reasons why he declined to act.

ON the 20th of last month, a largely attended meeting, at which the Rev. Dr. Cairns, Principal Raimy, Professor Calderwood, Messrs. J. Dick Peddie, M. P., and M. Buchanan, M. P., were present, was held in Edinburgh to consider the question of the disestablishment of the Church of Scotland. The following resolutions were carried by large majorities:—That the continued establishment of one of the Presbyterian churches in Scotland is an ecclesiastical wrong and a political injustice. "That the time has come for pressing the question upon the Legislature for early and final settlement." "That in view of the importance and urgency of the question the electors and community of Scotland ought to be prepared to give an unequivocal answer to the question at the next general election." "That the meeting, being convinced that the resolution proposed by Mr. Dick Peddie for the next session of Parliament is according to truth and justice, resolves to petition in its favor."

IN pursuance of an Act of the General Assembly of this Island, made and passed in the forty-third year of the reign of Her present Majesty Queen Victoria, intitled "An Act to amend the Act of the Eighteenth Victoria, Chapter thirty-four, intitled 'An Act to Incorporate the Town of Charlottetown and all Acts amending the same.'" I do hereby give Public Notice that an Election of a Mayor and One Person to Serve as a Common Councillor in the City Council for each Ward of said City, Being in all a MAYOR and FIVE COMMON COUNCILLORS, will be held on WEDNESDAY, the 25th Day of January, A. D. 1882

At the several places, that is to say:— In Ward No. 1, at or near the Store of Messrs J. & T. Morris, corner of Queen and Water Streets. In Ward No. 2, at or near the house of Mr. Thomas Connolly, opposite Mr. R. Hearty's Warehouse, Sydney Street, between Great George and Prince Streets. In Ward No. 3, at or near the Market House. In Ward No. 4, at or near the Fire Engine House, fronting on Kent Street, east, between Weymouth and Cumberland Streets. Number Four shall comprise all that part of Charlottetown which lies south of Fitzroy and north of Grafton Streets. Number Five shall comprise all that part of Charlottetown which lies North of Fitzroy Street, including the Common of the said Town.

Act 43 Victoria Cap 15: "SEVEN days before the time of any and every Election for Mayor or Councillors, the persons or candidates for the office of Mayor or Councillor shall give their names in as such candidates to the City Clerk, and the City Clerk shall duly enter the names, residences, and additions of such persons together with the offices and Wards for which they are candidates, and such entry, when made, shall be deemed nomination for such candidates."

"There shall be paid by each person so nominated for Mayor, at the same time, a fee of ten dollars, and by each person so nominated as Councillor a fee of five dollars, which sums shall go towards paying the cost of the election."

"No person shall be qualified either for the office of Mayor or Councillor unless such nomination be made in manner and at the time aforesaid."

The time appointed for the nomination of candidates shall be from the time of Twelve at noon, until the hour of four o'clock in the afternoon of the day fixed for that purpose. Qualification of Electors. See Act 43 Victoria, cap. 15, sec. 20 and 64.
