WASHINGTON, June 26.

The Navy Department is in receipt of advices from Engineer Melville, dated Lena Delta, March 25th, 1882, in which he gives a detailed account of his operations to that date and full particulars of the finding of the remains of DeLong and comrades. He also forwards a copy of the log book of Lt. DeLong. This shows the party suffered terribly from cold. Their food was dog meat.

NEW YORK, June 26.

Patrick Egan cables from Paris that the landlords are forming a company to work the lands of evicted tenants now lying idle, and mean to banish the Irish people and replace them with English and Scotch farmers. He says that the real struggle of the Land League is only beginning.

ALEXANDRIA, June 26.

The Khedive held a grand reception to-day in celebration of the anniversary of his accession to power. The foreign men-of-war in the harbor exchanged salutes with the forts.

PORTSMOUTH, Eng., June 26.

Three hundred marines and three hundred men of the marine artillery have been ordered to embark on the troop ship Orontes, which sails for the Mediterranean on Wednesday.

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., June 26.

Advices show that yesterday's wind storm was very severe in Iowa, Indiana, Nebraska and Kansas and immense damage was done to property. Some additional fatalities to those reported last night are announced.

NEW YORK, June 26.

Panama advices of the 17th state that much destitution exists in Bolivia owing to the destruction of crops by locusts.

In the matter of an Act of the Parliament of Canada, passed in the forty-fifth year of Her present Majesty's reign, chapter 23, intitled an Act respecting Insolvent Banks, Insurance Companies, Loan Companies, Building Societies and Trading Corporations, and of the President, Directors and Company of the Bank of Prince Edward Island, an Insolvent Banking Company.
