GENERAL NEWS.

LONDON, Oct. 11. The statement is reiterated by the Russian press that no idea of mediation has been entertained by England or Austria; that no attempt has been made in that direction.

The Comptroller General of the Russian Empire has unexpectedly arrived at Bucharest, to inspect accounts of army contractors.

A Berlin despatch says Turkey is about to offer liberal terms of peace.

The steamer "Cousett," from Antwerp for New York, arrived at Queenstown with bows stove and forward compartment filled with water, result of collision with the ship "Jessor" of Liverpool, with passengers for Melbourne, Wednesday morning, one hundred miles east of Fastnet. The "Jessor" sank. The "Cousett" rescued all hands.

The Swedish barque "Aurora," from New York for Molmo, which arrived at Cowes yesterday, landed the crew of the barque "George Kremelberg," from New York for Queenstown, before reported abandoned.

The race at New Market was won by Beauclerc.

All immediate apprehension of famine in Northern India next year has passed away, though high prices and some pressure on the poor remains until spring crop is assured. Weather and crop prospects in Singapore, Bombay and Madras also continue favorable. Financial prospects are much improved by the change in the situation.

A battle was fought on Tuesday near Aledja Doh, near Kars, lasting from midday until six o'clock in the evening. Losses heavy on both sides. A movement discernible on Wednesday morning in Russian camp, which seems to indicate renewal of fighting.

Turkish war office confirms report of junction of Chiefket Pasha with Osman Pasha, and entry of reinforcements and supplies into Plevna.

Duc de Broglie, speaking at a meeting of the Conservative Committee at Paris, defended the Government from the charge of clericalism. The real issue, he said, was Conservatism or Radicalism—MacMahon or Gambetta. The latter wore a mask—sheltering himself first behind Thiers and then behind Grey. He dreaded Gambetta's accession to the Presidency, which might ensue, should they desert President MacMahon, who had no desire to destroy the Republic.

MONTREAL, Oct. 11. Seizure has been put on the Levis and Kennebec Railway by the first bondholders.

Sheehan, Ryan and McAllister, charged with shooting with malicious intent during the orange riots, were discharged.

Kearney, the storeman to Frothington and Workman, was arrested for robbing goods of the firm.

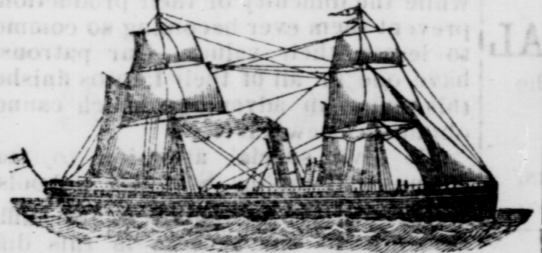
