NEW TENSION IS CREATED BY INCIDENT

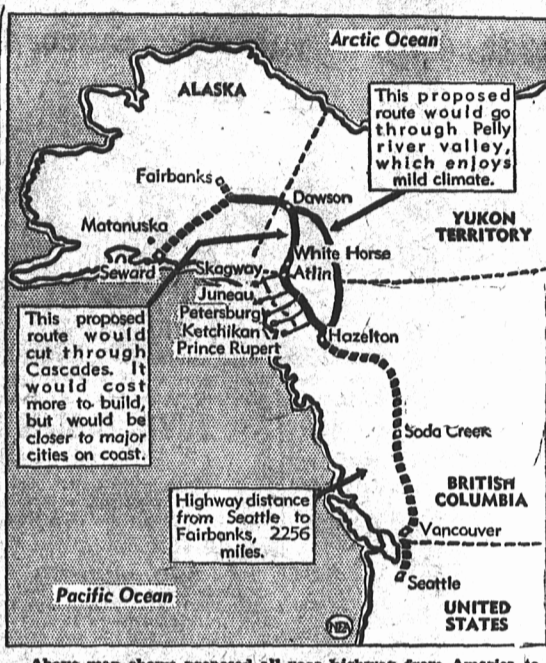
Danzig-Polish Versions of Fatal Shooting Differ Widely. (By Alvin J. Steinkopf, Associated Press Foreign Staff) DANZIG, July 20.—A Danzig customs officer shot and killed a Polish soldier today near the Danzig frontier village of Postelau and officials of the Polish Commission here declared tonight they would demand satisfaction from the Nazi control in this case.

More men from Danzig's strengthened police force were sent to border points. The shooting also irritated the Danzig Nazi authorities and heightened tension along the uneasy frontier with Poland.
