The late Mrs. McKenna, before her marriage in 1945, was Florence Kelly, daughter of Patrick Kelly and Mary Jane Hynes. Her parents and two sisters predeceased her. Early in her life she assumed the responsibility of the home and the loving care of her sister, Margaret. (OP)—Canada defeated Switzerland 4-5 Sunday in a warm-up for the world hockey championships scheduled to start at Stockholm later this month. It was the last of three exhibition games in Switzerland for the Canadians—Toronto East York Lynx—hurling—and it was their toughest. They apparently are having difficulty adjusting to the European game in which body contact plays a lesser part than in Canada. As a result, penalties played a big part in the game. The Swiss team got two goals in the second period while the Canadians were short-handed and two more to tie the score 5-5 in the third period when the Lynx hurled men in the penalty box for a total of eight minutes. Moe Gaisan, 25-year-old right-winger who formerly played junior A hockey for Oshawa and Stratford in the Ontario Hockey Association, got two goals for the Canadians. His second was the winning tally and he got it with only five minutes to play. Other Canadian scorers were George Sayliss, John Peeter, Carl Clement and John Scott.
